

AFTERNOON OF MUSIC ENJOYED

Matinee Musicales Members Hear Excellent Program by Favorites.

MISSION STUDY CLASS OF EPISCOPAL CHURCHES

Bowen-Maxted Nuptials — Miss Viener and Miss Oreck Are Hostesses.

A charming program at Pilgrim Congregational church yesterday afternoon well repaid the members of the Matinee Musicales for braving the rain. The audience was almost as large as on the sunniest of days.

Miss Wilhelmina Fitger and Miss Barbara Rupley had arranged a program of interest and variety. The surmise of the afternoon to many was Miss Julia Hunter an able pianist who is heard all too seldom. A Grieg nocturne, the opening number in the group, proved an admirable introduction. It was played with a sympathy of treatment, a poetic insight, that is one of the characteristics of Miss Hunter's work. In this, as in the odd Gilere prelude and the dainty "Siccatto Caprice" by Vogrich, the pianist gave full value to the underlying melodies of her selections, instead of blurring them into one incongruous whole, as is often done.

David A. Soderquist, baritone, although handicapped by a slight cold, gave a good account of himself. He sang in English, Swedish and French, the two closing numbers being perhaps the most pleasing. These were Wilson's always delightful "Pretty Creature" and strongly contrasted with it, "A Dirge of Love," dedicated to Mr. Soderquist by the young composer, Richard Canterbury. This is

a characterful number, though of lyric quality to suit Shakespeare's words, and well adapted to the voice of the singer. Mr. Soderquist's tones are smooth, he has plenty of volume and he sings with intelligence.

Miss Marie Ellsworth Clark pleased her hearers, as always, in three selections, closing with that favorite musical morsel, "The Year's at the Spring," by Mrs. Beach. Flexibility, brilliancy and a certain freshness of tone all help to make Miss Clark's voice an enjoyable thing to hear.

R. Buchanan Morton, a recent recruit to Duluth's musical circles, gave the numerous movements of Noble's "Variations on an Original Theme," in a musicianly manner. The overture of Nicolai's "Merry Wives of Windsor" was given an eight-hand rendition, being played by Mrs. John A. Stephenson, Miss Louella Gleason, Mrs. Floyd M. Fuller and Mrs. J. N. McKindley. The number was well played and heartily applauded. Accompanists of the afternoon were Mrs. Stephenson and Mrs. Fred G. Bradbury.

At the business meeting at noon, several new active members were considered. The Matinee Musicales is progressing in all its departments.
