

# SCHUBERT CLUB ARTISTS HEARD

Delightful Program Given by  
Visiting Women Before the  
Matinee Musicale.

MRS. HARPER HOSTESS  
AT BRIDGE PARTIES

Miss Enockson Entertains Informally—Levins-Johnson and  
Hawks-Jensen Weddings.

Pilgrim church was filled yesterday with an audience of women and a few men to welcome artists of the Schubert club of St. Paul in a delightful program of vocal and piano music.

Mrs. George S. Richards, president of the Matinee Musicale, whose members and guests comprised the audience, gave a brief address before the program began. Mrs. Richards announced that the prize song by Miss Faith Helen Rogers, "A Ballad of Trees and the Master," would be given its first public presentation at the Matinee Musicale program of Feb. 1. Mrs. Richards introduced Mrs. Florence L. C. Briggs, president of the Schubert club, who spoke on last year's reciprocity program.

Mrs. Briggs said: "I bring the hearty greetings of the Schubert club. We are always conscious of the fellowship of your good work, but this hand-to-hand contact is especially desirable. I congratulate you on your growth both numerically and in musical ideals. You have held your own by efficient management and the splendid co-operation of the people of Duluth.

"A large club furnishes many advantages—many points of contact. The small inner circle gains by contact with the viewpoint of the large outer circle."

Mrs. Bessie Farnell Weston, the pianist of the afternoon, won the attention of her audience at once by the brilliance of her playing and held its admiration through several numbers by a masterly style and splendid technique. Her Chopin preludes were interesting in the extreme. She seems to have a special fondness for Rachmaninoff, and interprets him well. She closed her program with his "Polichinelle." The humorous numbers, Debussy's "Dans le Style et le Mouvement d'un Cake Walk," and "Homage to S. Pickwick, Esq., P. P. M. P., C." and a TschaiKowsky Humoresque proved interesting, especially the "Pickwick" number, whose bombastic phrases began with an arrangement of "God Save the King." Mrs. Weston will, without doubt, always be welcome on a Duluth program.

The charming soprano of Mrs. Jessica De Wolf was heard in a bouquet of songs well suited to her voice. Mrs. De Wolf's is a finished art and her manner of singing all her songs was worthy of attention. Although clever coloratura work was done in Salter's "Hush, Little One," the singer's most beautiful effects were achieved in the same composer's "Her Love Song." "Die Lorelei" was given a musicianly reading. Mrs. De Wolf is the possessor of tones that are melody itself. She was heartily applauded and was generous with encores. Her accompanist was Mrs. James Bliss, a pianist who kept in excellent accord with the soloist.

After the program there was an informal tea in the vestry rooms of the church. The board of directors and the hospitality committee of the Matinee Musicale received with Mrs. Richards and the visiting artists. In the evening, before the visitors left for St. Paul, an informal buffet supper was served at the home of Mrs. C. A. Duncan, 2215 East Second street. Present were the visiting artists, with Mrs. Briggs, the board of directors of the Matinee Musicale, the hospitality committee, hostesses entertaining the visiting artists, and the Duluth artists who will appear on the reciprocity program before the Schubert club in St. Paul, Jan. 27.
