THE CITY COUNCIL

COUNCIL CHAMBER

Regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Virginia, Minnesota. Council called to order by the president. Roll call.
 Present: Aldermen Heritage, Harvey, Matheson, Lien, McGhee, Coffey, Mr. President.
 Absent: Aldermen Walsh, Murray-2.
 Reading of minutes of previous meeting.
 Moved and supported that the minutes be approved as read.
 Carried.
 The health officer submitted twenty-three applications for licenses to sell milk and cream in the city according to the ordinance and attached to the applications was a check of \$3.20 in payment of these applications.
 Moved and supported that the applications be accepted, the licenses issued and the money for the same turned over to the city treasurer.
 Carried.
 Alderman Murray takes his seat in the council.
 Moved and supported that the city clerk be instructed to advertise for proposals to furnish to the city the necessary lumber for sidewalks and other purposes, the dimensions for the same to be the same as the specifications furnished for the proposal during the year 1914.
 Carried.
 The most inspector submitted his reports of inspection of meat markets, bakeries and groceries for the weeks ending March 23 and 30, 1915 stating that these institutions were in good condition at the date of these inspections and the same were accepted and ordered filed.
 Geo. E. Hamilton made application for renewal of liquor license at No. 402 Chestnut street and presented a \$200 surety bond.
 Moved and supported that the application be granted, the license ordered issued, the bond accepted and ordered filed after being approved by the mayor and city engineer and a resolution be drawn covering the granting of this license.
 Carried.
 Eddy & Frijola made application to the council to have their automobile license No. 65 transferred to a 1914 Packard.
 Moved and supported that the application be granted and the license be granted and that the city clerk be instructed to note this transfer on his records.
 Carried.
 Geo. E. Hamilton applied to the council for a renewal of his liquor license No. 416 to for the year ending March 31, 1915. Application on this application was referred to the license committee.
 Chas. Ward applied to the council for license to operate a Duluth five-passenger automobile under the automobile ordinance of this city and submitted the fee of \$25.00.
 Moved and supported that the application be granted, the license ordered issued and the money turned over to the city treasurer.
 Carried.
 The Great Northern Mining company submitted in duplicate a renewal of license and permission to dig a new section of the surface of the south half of the northwest quarter of section 17, township 55, range 72, containing 40 acres, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining thereon an outlet ditch for a storm sewer, and the license was granted to the company to pass upon it to form.
 This subject is an emergency submitted to the council in duplicate, a renewal of permit and license to take material from the Arthur mine and road work, the license fee being \$500 per annum and the license running from January 1, 1915.
 Moved and supported that the mayor and city clerk be authorized to execute these licenses, in triplicate, and to file them for record, and to draw a warrant in favor of the Minnesota Iron company in the sum of \$500 in payment of this annual license.
 Carried.
 The report of the clerk of municipal court for the week ending March 27, 1915, was submitted to the council by the city attorney assigned and with a report that he suggested that the report be turned back to the clerk for correction in the matter of a certain criminal action, which was not reported in the report.
 Moved and supported that the report of the clerk of court for the week ending March 27, 1915, be returned to this official for correction according to the city attorney's notation.
 Carried.
 Nick Lundstrom made application to the city council and submitted as established in the market barn and the same was referred to the committee on city property and buildings.
 Larson Bros. applied for renewal of plumber's license under plumbers' ordinance and submitted a \$500 surety bond and also a fee of \$300 as an annual license fee.
 Moved and supported that the license be granted and the bond filed after being approved by the mayor and city attorney and the fee turned over to the city treasurer.
 Carried.
 The report of the chief of police of arrests in his department and of receipts of fines and costs collected in the court, attached to the report, March 27, 1915, was read, accepted and ordered filed.
 The special committee, appointed for the purpose of investigating the operations of a summary of such investigation relative to the non-compliance with the regulations under construction by the construction of a six-foot segmental block storm sewer by Lawrence-McCann company during the past year, and reported in a report in which the committee evidenced its inability to submit an intelligent report on such a practical matter and the committee recommended that this matter be placed in the hands of the council as a committee of the whole and that the president appoint a time and place at which the council could meet and definitely settle this proposition.
 Moved and supported that the report of the committee be accepted, the committee discharged and that the re-constitution of the committee be carried out.
 Carried.
 President Mollan set the date of such a committee meeting as of Thursday evening, April 8, 1915, at 8 o'clock p. m. in the committee room.
 James Stickey, foreman in charge of the work under construction by P. J. Donohue, to enlarge fire hall No. 1, reported that the work had been finished to his satisfaction and that Mr. Donohue has a final estimate due him in the sum of \$1,785.65.
 Moved and supported that the final estimate of James Stickey, foreman in charge of the work under construction by P. J. Donohue, in the sum of \$1,785.65 be accepted and that a resolution be ordered drawn and presented covering the payment of the final amount.
 Carried.
 The city engineer submitted a profile and the total cost of the construction of a storm sewer on the Eveleth road leading from a location in Scanlon addition south to Cherry street, then east on Cherry street to Central Avenue and north on a block on Central Avenue to Ash street, reporting the cost of this sewer to be \$4,973.85.
 Moved and supported that the report of the engineer as to the cost of this storm sewer construction be accepted and ordered filed.
 Carried.
 The city engineer and the street commissioner, in a signed report, gave a general report of the operations of the street, road and team department for the year ending April 1, 1915, this report giving a general synopsis of the work done under the heads of roads, street cleaning, sidewalks, street and alley grading, sewers and miscellaneous matters.
 Moved and supported that the report of the city engineer and street commissioner, relative to work done during the past year in their department, be accepted and ordered filed.
 Carried.
 Moved and supported that the street commissioner be instructed to place in good condition the roadway leading from Eveleth road to the gas plant.
