It requires no talking machine with the action of the films to make the pictures "audible," for he reads the lips of the actors on the screen.

Through the pantomime of the performers' racy conversation, which sometimes touches off the most dramatic or pathetic scenes with droll comedy, Mr. Hertlett, through his ability to interpret the side remarks of motion picture subjects is in much the same confidential position as can catch the undertone asides that actors frequently make to those in the wings.
