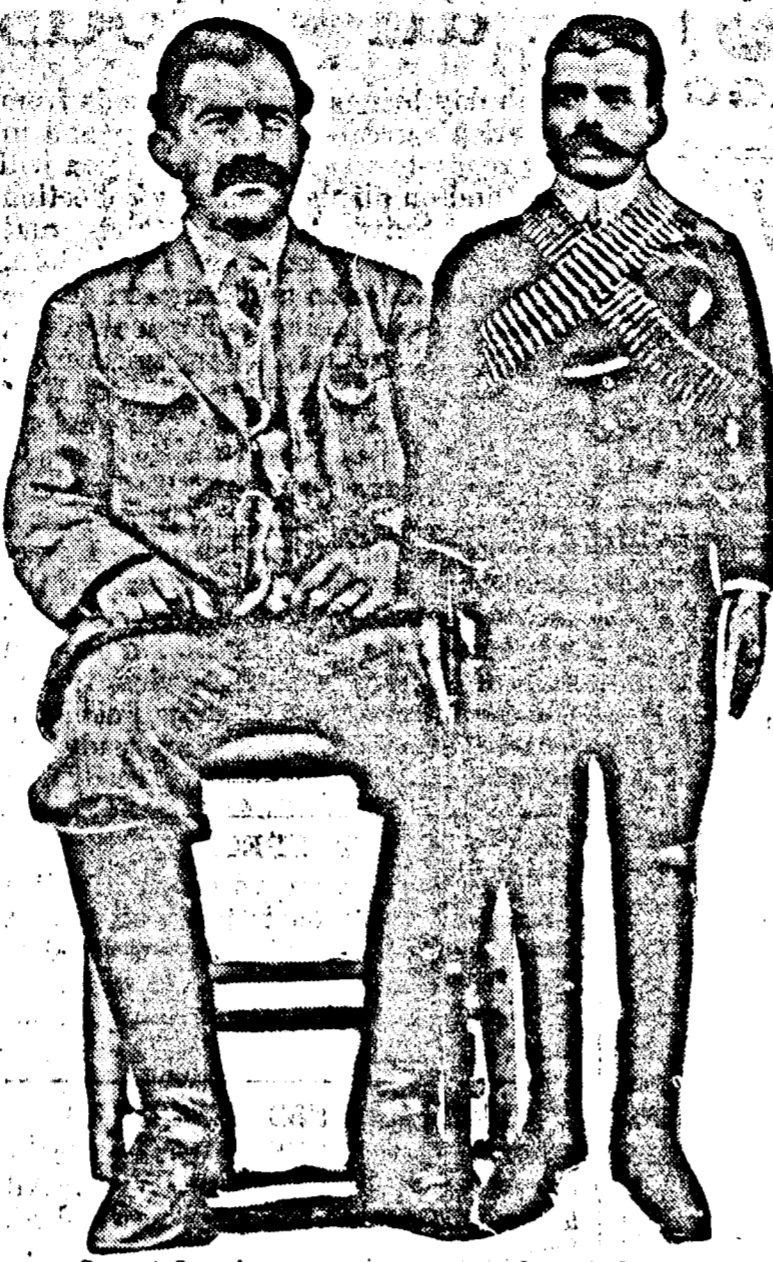

Mexico City has been taken again in a battle which lasted several days between the Carranza and the Zapata factions. General Gonzalez marched into the city Monday, according to despatches he had sent out. The Zapata troops evacuated Friday.

General Zapata, who until he took Mexico City, was rated as a bandit, and his troops were in possession of the capital for many months. General Villa left it to them when he moved north. Stories of the execution of the Zapata officers looted the banks and private houses as they left.

MOTHER OF R. R. WOLF DEAD

CLIPPING TAKEN FROM THE MARION, INDIANA, DAILY CHRONICLE TELLS OF THE DEATH OF THE MOTHER OF R. R. WOLF ON JULY 24.

The following clipping taken from The Marion, Indiana, Daily Chronicle gives a report of the death of Mrs. Mary Catherine Wolf, the mother of Sec. R. R. Wolf, of the local Y. M. C. A. Mrs. Wolf had been in ill health for some time.

Mr. Wolf left at once for the Indiana city when the sad news came and is attending the funeral which is taking place today. The report follows:

"Mary Catherine Wolf, aged 83 years, widow of the late J. G. Wolf, died at the residence in 207 Ninth Adams street at 10:05 Friday morning. The cause of death was diabetes. Mrs. Wolf's ailment had been of ten years' standing, but became serious only three weeks ago, since which time the condition of the deceased had become critical."

"Mrs. Wolf was born in Fountain-town, Ind., Feb. 13, 1852. In December 31, 1868, she was married to J. G. Wolf. They came to Marion eighteen years ago. Mr. Wolf at the time of his death three years ago owned and operated, with his sons, the Wolf coal yards and the Brown laundry.

"Deceased was a lifelong member of the Methodist Episcopal church, and at the time of her death was an active member of the local congregation. Her efforts in Christian work centered about the temperance idea, and she held at various times state, county and city office in the Women's Christian Temperance union.

Six Sons Survive. "Surviving the deceased are six sons, Orion O., Honor B., J. Carl and Dale Wolf all of Marion; Arthur, Indianapolis; Ralph, Fargo, N. D., one daughter, Mrs. L. R. Rigdon, Chicago; a niece, Miss Blanche Wolf, Morris-town, Ind., and eleven grandchildren. All the children were at the bedside of their mother when death occurred.

"The body will lie in state at the home Saturday afternoon and Sunday. Funeral services will be held at the residence at 10:30 o'clock Monday, in charge of Rev. J. F. Porter, Evans-ton, Ill., former pastor of the local M. E. church. The Rev. Porter will be the remains to Morris-town, where the body will be interred at the side of the husband. Services over the remains will be held at Morris-town Tuesday afternoon, after which burial will take place.

TO TAKE UP BOYS' WORK

CHARLES F. SHIELDS WILL ARRIVE IN FARGO ABOUT SEPT. 1 AND ASSUME CHARGE OF THE BOYS' DEPARTMENT AT THE Y. M. C. A.

Charles F. Shields of Niles, O., has been selected to take charge of the work in the boys' department at the Young Men's Christian association Sunday school worker. Following this he is expected to arrive in Fargo to assume his duties on Sept. 1. At present Mr. Shields is taking a summer post-graduate course in the Y. M. C. A. boys' work school at Lake Geneva.

Mr. Shields is 36 years of age and married. He is a graduate of the Niles, O., high school and Allegany college. His religious training began as a member of the Erie Mission Boys' club, where he gathered around him some 500 to 600 street boys and organized them into groups, forming a successful mission club.

Mr. Shields is a member of the Alpha Chi Rho fraternity and a member of the Presbyterian church.

BOOSTER SPIRIT IMPRESSES HIM

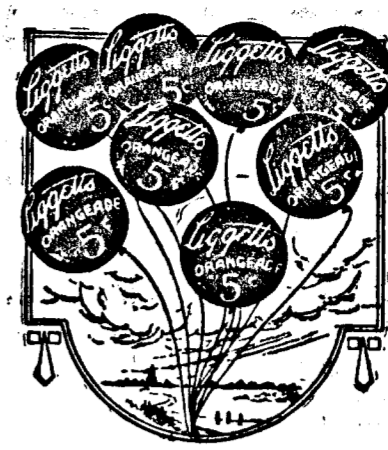
MAPLETON PIONEER DEAD
