FAMOUS WOMAN, HER BIRTHDAY AND YOURS

ISABELLA OF SPAIN.

Marie Isabel Luisa, usually known as Queen Isabella of Spain, was born in Madrid, Oct. 10, 1830. She was the daughter of Ferdinand VII of Spain and came to the throne at the tender age of 3, her mother being appointed as regent to act during her minority. Isabella's uncle, Don Carlos disputed her claim to the throne and began the long series of Carlist uprisings that have been carried on during the reign of Isabella and her descendants ever since. In 1840 the faction of the Carlists was defeated in a civil war that waged in Spain, and three years later, when she was 11, Isabella's majority was proclaimed. When she was 16 years old, she married her cousin, Francesco de Assis. Twenty years later the queen was deposed. Her son Alfonso XII, father of the present monarch became king in 1875. In the meantime the ex-queen of Spain retired to Paris where she led the life of a religious recluse in an out-of-the-way part of the busy French capital.

Whether or not the worst of the stories that are told against Queen Isabella are true, there is no doubt of the fact that she was far from being scrupulous either in political matters or in matters of private life. She was neither a good woman nor a wise one and showed very clearly in her reign the folly of a system which calls to the helm of the ship of state persons utterly unfitted by temperament and training to undertake matters of government.
