Quality rather than quantity was the keynote of yesterday afternoon's Musicales program, arranged by Miss Carlotta Simonds, and given at Pilgrim Congregational church. Each number was of real excellence. Mrs. Elizabeth Morton Dworschak and Mrs. Catherine Morton Elliott, in a two piano rendering of Saint Saens' variations on a theme by Beethoven, afforded the audience a genuine musical treat. It is a real pleasure to have Mrs. Dworschak back among musical affairs, and she and Mrs. Elliott presented the Saint Saens number in perfect accord.

Miss Florence Hyland's charming soprano was heard in Raff's "Lorelei," La Forge's "May's Coming," Worder's "Till I Wake," Chaminade's "Berceuse," and "Ecstasy" by Hummel. The singer exhibited the sweetness and richness of tone that are the distinguishing features of her voice. Her numbers were all warmly applauded. Mrs. Dworschak's accompaniments were valuable adjuncts to each selection.

Although delightful was the musical setting by Liza Lehmann of Oscar Wilde's legend, "The Foolish Giant," told and played by Miss Berta Schmied. One could not help wishing that an audience of children had been present to enjoy the beautiful simplicity of it, though only a grown-up music-lover would realize how admirably its musical phrases fitted the text. Miss Schmied followed reverently the ideas of narrator and composer. The entire program was enjoyable.
