

POLINSKY ASKS TO BE RELEASED AS SURETY

Julius Paul, recently convicted by a district court jury on a charge of defrauding A. N. Friedman of \$50 by false representations, will have to furnish a new bond by today or go to jail. He was brought before District Judge Fesler yesterday morning on a bench warrant, after M. Polinsky, one of his bondsmen, had asked that he be released as a surety. Polinsky explained that he only intended to act as a surety on the bond until the trial, which was held more than a week ago.

Paul was jointly indicted with Edward Fitzpatrick. The latter was acquitted by the same jury which convicted Paul. It is understood that Paul will appeal to the supreme court from the verdict and rulings of the trial court. He and Fitzpatrick were accused of obtaining \$50 from Friedman in a "come on" game, with Paul acting in the capacity of the "bust steerer" and Fitzpatrick as the "hayseed." Friedman, according to the testimony at the trial, paid Paul \$10 commission for finding him a purchaser for his store, but the sale was never made.
