

Beautiful Floral Setting for Levy-Levin Wedding

A wedding of exquisite appointments yesterday was that of Miss Hazel Levin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gust Levin, 431 East Second street, and Abe B. Levy of St. Paul, which took place at 5 o'clock in the ballroom of the Spalding hotel. Dr. N. S. Dienard of Minneapolis read the service. The bride was given in marriage by her father. Miss Rae Levy of St. Paul, sister of the bridegroom, was the maid of honor, and the flower girls were the bride's sister, Miss Josephine Levin, and Miss Gertrude Levy of St. Paul, another sister of the bridegroom. Benjamin Misiel of Toledo, Ohio, was best man, and Clarence Levy and Harold Finkelstein, both of St. Paul, were the ushers. Mrs. Donna Riblette Flaaten sang "O Perfect Love," before the ceremony. La Brosse's orchestra played the "Lohengrin" bridal chorus as a processional, and "Mendelssohn's" wedding march as a recessional, with appropriate nuptial music played softly during the ceremony. The ceremony took place beneath a canopy of green, with tall vases of Easter lilies and pink peonies effectively grouped. Bay trees, ferns and palms were used to mark the section for the wedding guests.

GOWN IS OF WHITE SATIN.

The bride wore a handsome gown of white satin and tulle made with a court train fastened from the shoulders. The bodice was made of Duchesse lace. Her veil of rose point lace was caught in cap arrangement with French orange blossoms and she wore a short face veil of the same lace. The bridal bouquet was a shower arrangement of lilies of the valley. The maid of honor was gowned in pink taffeta fashioned after the style of 1850, with scalloped flounces of pink tulle. The bodice and streamers were of a deeper shade of pink velvet, with a fichu of silver lace. Touches of blue were brought out by flowers at the bodice and upper flounce and streamer ends. She carried a floral muff of blue tulle and pink Killarney roses in a shower arrangement.

The little flower girls wore lace frocks with pink taffeta coats. They carried large pink hats filled with pink rose buds and sweet peas and caught together with bows of pink satin. The hats were suspended from the shoulders by blue satin streamers. Mrs. Gust Levin, mother of the bride, wore a delightful creation of

black lace and tulle with jet trimmings. The bridegroom's mother, Mrs. Joseph Levy of St. Paul, wore an exquisite white lace gown.

WEDDING DINNER FOLLOWS CEREMONY.

At a wedding dinner for immediate relatives which followed the ceremony in the ballroom, covers were laid for 50. The tables were artistically arranged in the same color scheme of pink and French blue. A mound of pink Killarney roses and sweet peas combined with ferns centered the length of the tables, bows of blue satin and tulle being caught at different intervals. A large wedding cake formed the centerpiece at the table for the bridal party, with a tall vase filled with Easter lilies, pink peonies and Killarney roses arranged through the center of the cake. The other tables were placed at the corners of the section reserved for the dinner and formed a double L, indicative of the names of the bride and bridegroom. Large vases of Easter lilies and pink peonies were placed about the hall-room. Miss Sara Album of Minneapolis caught the bridal bouquet.
