## MAKE AWARDS FOR BIG PARADE

Winners of Prizes in Hibbing  
Fourth of July Celebration An-  
nounced by Committee.

HIBBING, July 6.—Fourth of July celebration at night in Hibbing was a riotous affair. Hundreds of people made merry at dances and the cafes presented scenes similar to New Year's eve celebrations.

After dark activities began with the pyrotechnic display, given at the foot of Third avenue. The streets were crowded and the attraction was of unusual merit.

Hibbing re-established its reputation as one of the best entertainers on the range. Secretary J. E. Lawler of the Commercial club and members of the committees in charge perfected arrangements so there was no hitch in the entertainment.
