

WILL SENTENCE KIDS TO SCHOOL

Eveleth Judge Declares That
Is How He Will Punish
Juveniles.

OPEN SUMMER SCHOOL

More Than 1,000 Pupils Are
in Attendance—Plan
an Innovation.

EVELETH, June 15.—Summer school, with an attendance of more than 1,000 pupils, including those of the kindergarten, has been opened here for the first time in the history of the local schools.

Before the summer school system was tried out, the sentiment of the people of the city and the pupils was tested. It was found that a majority preferred the summer school, as it enables the children to gain three months.

The pupils are not required to attend the summer session of the school but by so doing may gain three months' credit or more, if they are able to advance rapidly in their subjects, so that it would be possible for them to save two years' work during the grades.

Eveleth is the only city in the state which conducts a summer school on this plan. In the past school has been conducted for those who failed and who wished to make up their grade during the summer.

Judge W. E. Moylan of the municipal court declared today that any juvenile cases coming into his court will be settled by the school, as he will sentence any children who become involved in trouble to go to school. This plan worked well with the juvenile cases last summer.
