The "round up" will be held from 3 to 5 o'clock Friday afternoon in the ballroom of the Spalding hotel, when the campaign committee will act as hostesses to the past, present and future friends of the Children's home. All who are helpfully interested are invited to attend this reception. No other invitation than this published notice will be issued, lest some one be forgotten. It is hoped that many men will drop in for tea or punch and lend the encouragement of their presence, especially those who have contributed so generously and courteously, or still wish to do so. It is expected that many associate members at \$1 per annum dues will be gained at this reception, and certainly all paid up associate members of the Children's Home society are requested to be present and bring other guests.
