friends to help him. He goes into their midst. Congestion often results. He finds conditions bad here. He soon learns that American democracy knows the inequality of wealth. He determines that he will graduate from the ghetto. His sojourn there is to be temporary. Like the city he neglects his environment. Only he has a better reason. He knows that when his thrift, ability and industry have earned him a small capital he can then live in a "better" part of the city where he will no longer be neglected. Consequently, the incentive to local improvement is lessened.

But this only tends to prove that the people do not want dirt and slovenliness. And the investigators who draw general conclusions which slander a whole people need enlightenment.—G. L.
