Mr. James Viener has returned after spending the week-end with Mr. and Mrs. M. Fink, St. Paul.

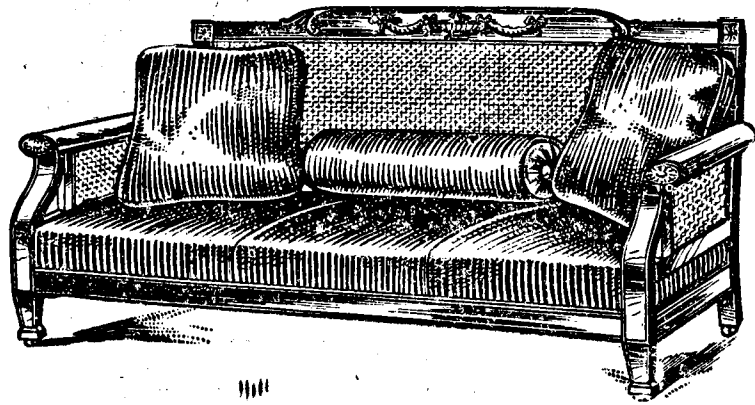
