

LIQUOR SALES FROM SLEIGH HELD ILLEGAL

Morris Zien Found Guilty, Fined
\$100 With Alternative of
Farm Term.

APPEAL NOTICE GIVEN

Charge Whisky Delivered With-
out Having Previously Received
Order from Purchaser.

Morris Zien, part owner of a saloon at 101 West First street, was convicted on a charge of selling liquor without a license in municipal court yesterday in the city's test suit to determine the legality of liquor sales "from the wagon."

The decision of Judge Smallwood brought to an end a series of postponements in municipal court since Zien's arrest early in January. Zien was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 or serve 85 days at the work farm. He gave notice of intention to appeal the case to the district court and was granted a stay of sentence for 20 days.

The saloon man was charged with having sold a bottle of whisky to Mike Kolambar, a pool hall owner in New Duluth, without having previously received an order from the purchaser. The sale, the prosecution contended, was consummated at Zien's delivery sleigh in front of Kolambar's pool hall.

The police admitted yesterday that, with the results of the recent special city election placing Duluth in dry territory on July 1, the decision in the test case against Zien will have little bearing for future prosecutions.
