

A KISS FOR A JITNEY AT HIBBING SCHOOL CARNIVAL

Exhibitions to Be Given by Girl Divers and Side- Show Attractions on Program.

HIBBING, April 3.—Who will be the Queen of the Carnival at the Junior-Senior prom tomorrow night? That is the question being asked among the students of the Lincoln high school. A contest began yesterday morning to elect the queen, at a mass meeting held in the Auditorium, which promises to be more exciting before the "most popular girl" is crowned queen at the close of the carnival. Votes are being cast at one penny a vote.

The carnival, which will be given in the gymnasium, will make the junior-senior this year different from any previously given. It will begin at 7:30 o'clock and last until 9:30, when dancing will commence.

Art Students Exhibit.

Forty life-size panels have been painted to represent the attractions in the booths, by the art students, under the direction of Miss Mary Goshorn, art instructress. Flags and bunting will complete the decorations.

Freak stunts in chemistry, electrical X-ray demonstrations, the petrified giant, the bodiless man, the snake-eater and the wild man will all be attractions. One may kiss the prettiest girl for five cents. The Gypsy fortune teller will be there, and in the swimming tank. Divers, under the direction of Miss Marie Richter, will give exhibitions. There will be a charge of 2 to 5 cents for each attraction. In an adjoining room there will be a Japanese tea garden where refreshments will be served during the entire evening. Mildred Graves will be in charge, assisted by Mary Erspamer and Violet Hooker as Japanese maidens, and Fanny Edelstein, a Japanese fruit vender.

Little Expense.

The prom has been so arranged this year, that there will be little expenses and all funds from the carnival and dance will be donated to the school fund which will take care of

wounded soldiers and sailors from the school.

Professor Ross Elliott and Miss Dean Dulaney, class advisors of the junior class, are in charge of the arrangements, assisted by the class committee. Hulda Lanberg, class president, is chairman, assisted by James Sheehy, Esther Danahy, Lewis Sachs, Gladys Booth and June Kaiser.

Invitations have been extended to the alumni, the students and the faculty. More interest is being manifested in this junior-senior than ever before, and a record attendance is expected.
