

WAR NO BAN ON HIBBING GROWTH, BUILDING SHOWS

Contractors More Rushed Than for Years—Many Private, Public Buildings Planned.

HIBBING, June 29.—That the war is no ban on building in Hibbing is evidenced by the large number of homes being built in the village, and especially in Parkview addition and Alice addition. Not in years have local contractors been so rushed with work as they are now. Besides a number of homes just completed several contracts for residences and other buildings have been let this week.

The contract for a new Christian Science church, to cost approximately \$4,000, was let this week to the Frederic Lumber company. Work on the building will begin next week.

The building is to be of gray stucco and will rise next the telephone company building on Washington street. This firm has contracts for homes for L. A. May on Third avenue in Alice and Isaac Cogola on Fifth avenue, Alice. They have just completed a five-room cottage for Truman Hamner on Fifth avenue.

Chris Spera, contractor, has just completed a home for Mike Delenish on Fifth avenue and Adeline street in Alice. This contractor is also building bungalows for Marino Valri, and Steven Fruen in Alice, while Victor Salo and Axel Salo are building homes in this addition.

Many New Homes

In Park addition a bungalow for John Eastman is under way. A residence for Patrick Connaker has just been completed. Work has also commenced on the Leo Coons residence on Roosevelt avenue.

Other prospective builders in this district are E. A. Bergeron and Thomas Ryan. Work will commence soon on these homes. Dr. G. N. Butchart's home has just been moved from Hibbing here. A duplex frame house for Edward Bublely is being built in this location.

Herbert Frank has just purchased the home of A. B. Johnson in Alice. Dr. Quigley of the Rood hospital bought the Andrew Guyette home here.

Foundations have been completed in the Larabee forty by the Oliver Iron Mining company for the former J. F. Dietrich and William J. West residence, which will be moved there. These will be occupied by William Tappan, assistant general superintendent, and Mr. Driscoll, superintendent of construction.
