

REPORTED DEAD, HIBBING SOLDIER RETURNS IN 151ST

Lawrence Collins, Whose Death Was Announced, Startles Friends at Home Coming.

HIBBING, May 10.—Members of the Hibbing delegation who attended the homecoming reception of the One Hundred and Fifty-first field artillery at Minneapolis, were startled but pleased to see Lawrence Collins, Hibbing man, whose death in France was announced last week, in the parade.

Becoming anxious at the lack of information from Collins, C. G. Anderson, a local attorney, wrote to officers of the last company that he was known to be with. Lieutenant Moran of that company informed them that Collins died in a French hospital on Aug. 1, 1918.

Never in Casulities. His name never appears in the casualty lists as far as Hibbing friends could ascertain and hope was held out from the first that he might be alive. His friends were overjoyed to see him in the line of march at Minneapolis.

His name was transferred to the company while in France and letters to home folks had evidently gone astray.

VIRGINIA WOMAN ASKS DIVORCE

Civil Cases on Court Calendar Will Be Taken Up Tomorrow.

VIRGINIA, May 10.—Cruel and inhuman treatment and desertion were allegations in a divorce action filed in district court this morning, by Nellie Grant Mills against her husband, Moses Mills. Trial on the case will be held at the August term which convenes here Aug. 24.

In the complaint the plaintiff alleges that they were married in May, 1905, at Hattiesburg, Miss. She alleges that he deserted her on April 17, 1918.

The civil suit of the Paine & Nixon company against Morris Shabazz, at which was started in district court yesterday was held open by Judge Edward Freeman, presiding judge for further evidence.

The plaintiff is suing for the recovery of \$120 alleged due on three promissory notes. No cases were heard today, court adjourning until Monday morning, at which time the remaining court cases will be called for trial.

SEEDS, CHICKS, ADVICE ARE OFFERED CARLTON FARMERS

C. P. Johnson, Agricultural Agent Is Distributing Strawberry Plants and Equipment.

CARLTON, May 10.—Seeds, poultry nursery stock and advice are being given to the farmers in the burned-over district through the office of C. P. Johnson, county agent. The state and federal department of agriculture have donated large quantities of grain and grass seed to be given to the Carlton county farmers.

The Minnesota Horticultural society has offered for the Carlton county farmers in the fire-swept area by the members of the society. Special application for these plants must be made to County Agent Johnson and instructions will be given with each lot for planting and care. R. S. Mackintosh, president of the organization, was here this week, conferring with Mr. Johnson on methods of distribution.

Much nursery stock has been received through various sources to be given to the fire-stricken farmers. Mr. Johnson has charge of this stock also. Application for this stock must be made to him.

RANGE STUDENTS 'POUND KEYS' FOR SPEED RECORDS

Eight Schools Are Represented. Miss Mildred Almen of Biwabik Wins Honors.

BIWABIK, May 10.—Students in typewriting from Aurora, Eveleth, Mountain Iron, Chisholm, Hibbing, and Biwabik competed today for honors in two contests held at the Biwabik high school. The contests were divided into two classes: for first year and for second year typewriting students. The speed record was won by Miss Mildred Almen of the local high school who in a ten minute contest averaged 55 words per minute on new matter.

In the contest for second year students, Miss Edna Grekola of Hibbing won first place with an average of 54 words per minute. Miss Anna A. Fox of Hibbing was second with 52.4 words per minute and Miss Rita Lewis of Chisholm was third with 52.2 words per minute. Students from Aurora, Eveleth, Mountain Iron, Chisholm and Hibbing were in this contest.

In the first year competition, Miss Mildred Almen of Biwabik won over students from Aurora, Eveleth, Biwabik, Hibbing and Nashwaik with an average of 48 words per minute. Miss Edna Grekola of Hibbing was second with 47.8 words and Miss Anna A. Fox of Hibbing, third with 47.5 words.

HIBBING, May 10.—Because of his belief that denatured alcohol is freely used for a beverage, Judge Thomas F. Brady had issued a warning to local druggists against indiscriminate sale of the poison.

A number of men who have appeared before him on the charges of drunkenness have shown evidence of the use of that drug, Judge Brady says.

The judge said when denatured alcohol is used as a beverage, "druggists must exercise caution in the sale of the liquor. At any indication that it will be used for a beverage, the purchasers must be refused."

BOYS FIND BODY OF CHISHOLM LAD Missing Since Christmas, Youth Is Found in Longyear Lake. Was Skating.

CHISHOLM, May 10.—Boys playing on a raft at the north end of Longyear lake today discovered the body of James Everett, 14-year-old son of William Everett, local contractor, who was drowned here at the end of December.

The body was sighted floating on the lake. One of the youngsters in the party who had seen the unfortunate youth when he disappeared and dragged the body into shore.

The Everett boy left his home to go skating on Longyear lake, a few days before Christmas. He was alone and when he did not return his parents began a search for him. They found no trace of him. Authorities all over the range added in the search for several weeks.

The lake was frozen over and it was impossible to look for his body at that time. It is believed that he fell into an air hole. No funeral arrangements have been made.

Two and a Half Miles of Base, 110,000 Square Feet of Flooring Needed.

VIRGINIA, May 10.—The school board members are puzzled over the figures presented by nine concerns bidding for the flooring of the new junior high school contract. The board resumed work this morning after an eight-hour session last night.

One hundred ten thousand square feet of flooring and two and a half miles of base board are needed for the new high school.
