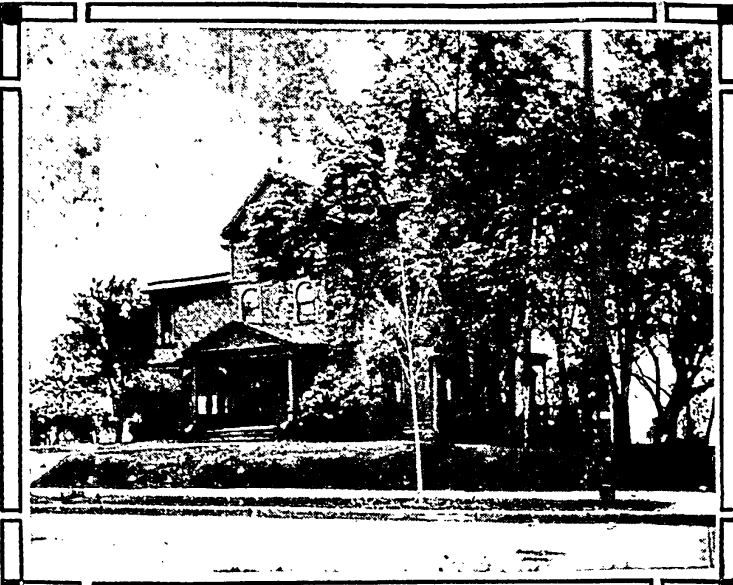


INCREASE RATES ON DULUTH PHONE SERVICE FRIDAY

Residence and Business Service Charges Raised From 66 Cents to \$2 Monthly—No Discount.

Kana, manager of the Duluth Telephone company.
"These regulations are the same as have been in effect for Interstate telephone calls since Jan. 21, but they have not been put in force here because only recently the United States supreme court fixed the authority for raising telephone rates within the state.
"The principal change from the former method of determining long distance telephone rates is the increase of one cent on each call. There are several changes with a different rate. For example, there is one charge for long distance calls when anyone will talk at the telephone called, another when a definite person is desired, another for "station to station" calls, for night calls, and so on.
"The basis of all charges on long distance telephone calls under the new regulation is the "station to station" rate. This is determined by the air line distance between towns. The rate is computed for the initial mile of one cent for each mile up to 25 miles and 5 cents for each eight miles beyond that.
"Station to station" rate applies when the calling party does not wish to talk to a particular person at the telephone, but merely wishes to talk to anyone who answers the telephone. The word "station" as used here means "telephone." The service is a telephone to telephone method. "Station to station" calls must be made either by giving the telephone number of the station to be called, or by giving the name and address under which the telephone is listed. If the calling party states that he wishes to talk to a definite person, the "person to person" rate, which is higher, is charged.
"Can't Reverse Call. Charge for Reverse Call. The "report charge" applies when a "person to person" call, an "appointment" call or a "messenger" call is made and the person desired is not in or will not talk or when the exact address of the person desired has not been given and cannot be reached at a telephone within the limits of the city. If the connection is made and the conversation held later in the same day the "report charge" is not made. This charge also applies when the calling party is absent when the connection is completed within one hour.
"Night Rate Charge. On "station to station" calls, where the rate is 25 cents or less, an initial three minute period of minutes is permitted. For longer conversations an additional charge will be made. On "person to person" calls, "messenger" calls and "messenger" calls the initial three minute period is three minutes.
"Night Rate Apply Only to "Station to station" calls. Day rates apply at night on other classes of service. The rate for station to station calls made between 8:30 p. m. and midnight is about half the station to station day rate, and for calls made between midnight and 4:30 a. m. the rate is one-fourth of the station to station day rate. The minimum night rate is 25 cents and day rates are charged at night when the day rate is less than this."

CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN CITY

Episcopal Delegates From Northern Part of State to Meet at Cathedral.

As part of the nation-wide campaign, delegates from Northern Minnesota Episcopal churches will meet in a diocesan conference at Trinity Cathedral, Twentieth avenue East and Superior street tomorrow. The purpose of the assembly will be to discuss questions of the church, its needs, plans for membership campaigns and means to raise funds to continue social service, educational and missionary activities of the church.

The second session will be held at 2 p. m. and the last one at 8. Speeches will be given at these gatherings, which will be presided over by Bishop J. H. Morrison of Duluth, by Rt. Rev. W. L. Burleson, Bishop of South Dakota, and Rev. E. R. Williams of the St. Paul's church, Milwaukee.

COMMITTEE ENDS WORK; DISBANDS

Duluth and St. Louis County Readjustment Committee Completes Its Business.

Duluth & St. Louis County Readjustment committee, through which discharged soldiers and sailors have secured employment, strikes have been settled, civic problems have been solved and various other civic duties performed, is no more. Its members voted it out of existence at a meeting held yesterday noon at the Commercial club, the principal purpose for which it was organized having been accomplished.
But in ceasing their activities the members of the committee recommend that the various civic and central labor organizations "take ways and means to effect a permanent body, which shall consist of one delegate from each organization, to generally facilitate co-operation between civic bodies for the betterment of the community."
Other resolutions adopted are to the effect that a permanent arbitral tribunal fully empowered by law to mediate in industrial disputes be formed; to investigate both sides of the often heated statements of wages and prices; to have the cost of living more to live here; that the public be urged to support every practical and needed project before the community and that all voters be urged to vote "yes" on the proposition to issue bonds at the election July 1, to build hard-surfaced highways.

COUNTY WILL GET \$1,500 PER YEAR ADDITIONAL AID

Law Providing Establishment of Farm Bureaus to Be Compiled With.

St. Louis county will receive about \$1,500 a year additional state and federal aid for agricultural and home economics work with the reorganization of the St. Louis County club, which is expected to be effected within a few days. Representatives of the county club, state agricultural agents and home economics agents, and county agents met in conference at the courthouse yesterday to consider the application of the new farm bureau law to St. Louis county.
The law, passed at the last session of the state legislature, provides for the establishment in each county of the state of county farm bureau association. Each county will be entitled to \$1,000 a year from the state and \$500 a year from the government in addition to the \$1,200 now being expended by the government upon the home demonstration bureau.
With slight reorganization of the St. Louis County club and change of name to include Farm Bureau association, St. Louis county will be entitled to this considerable state and federal aid. The change has been recommended by the committee which met yesterday and will be acted upon by the club's board of directors within a few days.
Twenty Offices
The offices of the county agricultural agents and home demonstration agent will continue to be the points of primary activity of the bureau in addition to the office of the secretary of the club.
The conference yesterday was particularly helpful in that it elected county agent leader; E. B. Cleland, assistant state county agent leader; Miss Moe Seese, state home demonstration agent; Larson, vice president of the St. Louis County club; R. L. Giffen, secretary of the club; J. Gibson, county agricultural agent; E. Colquhoun, county agricultural agent; A. B. Hoetter, district agricultural agent, and Miss Mary Stillwell, home demonstration agent.
"St. Louis county has an excellent organization in the St. Louis County club," said E. B. Cleland, state agricultural agent. "The club is practically fully prepared to function as a co-operating organization in compliance with the new farm bureau law. Few organizations in the state have such a well developed plan of committee organization whereby various activities which auger for the personal welfare and public good are promoted."
