Check Suspect Bound Over.

Peter F. Cosgrove, 19-year-old son of a Minneapolis attorney, charged with issuing worthless checks aggregating \$27.50 in Duluth, waived examination in municipal court yesterday. He was held to the district grand jury. The lad is believed by the police to be demented. He admitted, according to police, that he had passed several checks in the Twin Cities.

Case Demands Examination.

William D. Case, age 42, stationary engineer, demanded examination when he was arraigned in municipal court yesterday on a charge of abandonment. His hearing will be held Tuesday. Case was arrested by county authorities.

Women Forfeit Bail.

Matt Mattila, his wife, Ida Mattila and Hilda Johnson, arrested at a rooming house at 214 Second avenue West on charges of disorderly conduct, were arraigned in municipal court yesterday. The women forfeited \$25 bail each. Mattila pleaded not guilty. His hearing probably will be held today.

Horseman Sues for \$11,000.

Trial of a \$11,000 personal injury suit of Harry O. Hardy against the Duluth Street Railway company was commenced before Judge W. A. Cant in district court yesterday. The plaintiff claims to have sustained the damages while riding horseback. He collided with a street car.

A \$28,000 personal injury suit of David Haight against the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis & Omaha railway company, which was on trial before Judge W. A. Cant in district court, was dismissed yesterday on a motion by the plaintiff.

Ditch Job Approved.

St. Louis county commissioners have approved the inspector's report on the construction of county ditch No. 14, to be laid in the lettuce growing district beyond Woodland. The engineer's estimate places the cost of the job at \$8,150. The benefits are estimated at \$13,000. The ditch is about two miles in length.

War Veterans of Canada will hold their annual meeting at 2 o'clock Sunday at Memorial hall in the courthouse. The election of officers for the coming year will take place. A report on the Fort Arthur convention also will be heard.

Oil Bids Submitted.

Bids for 200,000 gallons of road oil to be used by the public works division in sprinkling Duluth's streets next summer will be opened at 11 a. m. today, it was announced yesterday. In view of possible declines in the oil market and a probable cut in freight rates, action on the bids may not be taken until after Jan. 1, officials said.
