Clubs Expect 400 Guests.

At least 350 persons will attend the joint meeting of the Lions, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs at the Spalding hotel tonight, preliminary reports on ticket sales tonight will be more than 400, it was estimated. Gov. J. A. O. Preus will arrive in Duluth this morning. He will address the clubs tonight.

Damages Reduced.

Louis Bergstein, defendant in a suit brought by August Lampl and Hilja Koski, will be granted a new trial, unless the plaintiffs agree to a reduced verdict, Judge H. A. Dancer declared in an order filed in district court yesterday. The plaintiffs sued for \$5000, alleging they leased a building from Bergstein, to be used as a restaurant, but were evicted before the lease expired. They were awarded a verdict of \$1,800 by a jury. Judge Dancer reduced the verdict to \$300.

New Trial Motion Filed.

Notice of motion for a new trial was filed in district court yesterday by attorneys for the Massachusetts Bonding and Insurance company, defendants in an action brought by Julia Forschner Tupper. Mrs. Tupper was awarded a verdict for \$2,200 against the company recently. The plaintiff alleged that a clause in an insurance policy, carried by the brother of the plaintiff, stated that double indemnity would be paid if the death of the insured was caused by a cyclone or tornado. Mrs. Tupper's brother was drowned when the steamer John Owen foundered.
