

GOOD WILL RACE BEGINS TO SHOW BURST OF SPEED

Tag Day for Superior Girl;
Range Legion, Press Club
Backs Candidate.

Miss Mazie McLimans, Morgan Park candidate in the Twin Ports and iron range Good Will election, and Miss Jessie Rawlings, Duluth nominee, continue to lead the field, according to balloting yesterday, although both are but comparatively few votes ahead of the remaining six candidates. A total of 846 votes have been cast to date in favor of Miss McLimans, while Miss Rawlings holds down second place with 705 ballots, 240 of which were cast yesterday.

Miss Ethel McKeever, with a standing of 253 votes, slipped into fourth place when Mrs. Marie Wisted Rowe, American Legion candidate, procured just enough votes to place her next to Miss Rawlings in the race. Mrs. Rowe's total is 256, just three votes ahead of Miss McKeever.

Changes Seen.

Several changes in the standing of the candidates are expected when reports are filed from Miss Rose Bissonette, iron range candidate, Miss Petrina Doble, Superior nominee, Miss Bessie Hintz of the Duluth Street Railway and Miss Lois Curtis of the Board of Trade. None of the last four named have made announcement of the number of votes they have obtained in the early campaigning.

Various measures, through which candidates will derive votes through the activities of clubs and organizations, are being planned by the respective campaign managers. Dances, card parties, social gatherings and other events will be staged on behalf of the nominees.

To Speed Balloting.

By the end of this week it is expected that balloting will be in full force, with the candidates subscribing votes through every possible medium.

The Good Will delegation to France, which sails July 22, is to be made up of winning candidates from the principal cities of the nation. The American committee for devastated France is sponsoring the campaign.

Mayor Fred A. Baxter of Superior yesterday gave his permission to hold a tag day in Superior, at which time votes will be subscribed for Miss Doble. Tags will be sold either next Saturday or on June 24, the date to be decided within a few days. Arrangements also have been made with Harvey Buchanan, manager of the People's theater, to show a special bill June 21, 22 and 23, a part of the proceeds on these days being turned over to Miss Doble. A dance at the pavilion at Billings park also is being arranged.

Range Nominee Indorsed.

The American Legion and the Women's Auxiliary post at Chisholm has indorsed the candidacy of Miss Bissonette. She was presented with a substantial number of votes by the Legionnaires, and the women are planning to arrange a program for the range candidate.

The range newspaper fraternity rallied to the support of Miss Bissonette, with the Range Press club of Hibbing, Frank Harris of Chisholm and Harry Rabinowitz of Eveleth, being among her most ardent supporters. The French club of Hibbing also is much interested in the election of Miss Bissonette.
