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In a recent article in the New York Evening Post, Mr. John Palmer Gavit, an able and sympathetic student of naturalization matters and of college conditions, states: "There has been a great, almost sensational increase recently in the number of Jews at Harvard. I have no official figures, but excellent reason for believing that 10 per cent in 1920 became 15 in 1921, and 20 per cent at present." The explanation of this increase, assuming that it is "sensational" and peculiar to Harvard only, in all probability is the simple one that discriminating Jewish college men in the East are attracted to "Fair Harvard" by its good name and by its splendid reputation for learning and liberality.

This good name has been won and maintained by the achievements of Harvard alumni and their contributions to American life. That Jewish alumni have helped to add glory to the name of Harvard cannot be questioned, for among a long list of these are to be found such names as Bernhard Berenson, art critic; Leonard Bloomfield, philologist; Meyer Bloomfield, authority on vocational guidance; Louis D. Brandeis, jurist; Morris R. Cohen, professor of philosophy; Isador H. Coriat, neurologist; Albert Ehrenfried, surgeon; David A. Ellis, lawyer; Abraham Flexner, educator;

Simon Flexner, pathologist; Nathan Frank, lawyer and ex-Congressman; Felix Frankfurter, professor of law; Herbert J. Friedman, lawyer and public worker; Isaac Goldberg, critic and translator; Alfred F. Hess, clinical professor of pediatrics; Ralph Horween, athlete; Henry Hurwitz, editor; Horace M. Kallen, professor of philosophy; Arthur Lehman, banker and philanthropist; Walter Lichtenstein, librarian and university professor; Walter Lippman, author and editor; David Gordon Lyon, orientalist; Julian W. Mack, jurist; Paul J. Sachs, professor of fine arts; Gilbert Selde, editor; Lee Simonson, stage director; Marcus C. Sloss, jurist; Joel E. Spingarn, authority on comparative literature; and Jacob Warshaw, professor of Romance languages.

The tuneful alumni song entitled "Fair Harvard," concludes with this solemn adjuration to the Alma Mater: "Let not moss-covered error moor thee to its side,

As the world on truth's current glides by;
Be the herald of light, and the bearer of love,

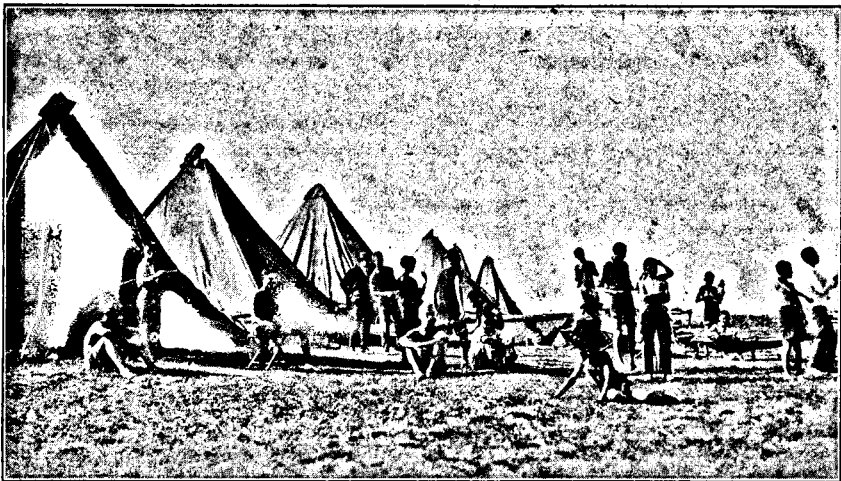
Till the stock of the Puritans die!" Is there any "error" more overgrown with "moss" and more antithetical to "truth," to "light" and to "love" than the two thousand years old error of Jew-hatred? Has the "stock of the Puritans" died?

MUSIC NOTES

Klatzkin Conducts Lake Harriet Band

The Minneapolis Park Board has secured Mr. Benjamin Klatzkin as Conductor of the Band at Lake Harriet which commenced its concerts on June 18. Mr. Klatzkin was brought here three years ago, by Emil Oberhoffer, and the Park Board is fortunate in securing his able services for the summer.

Mr. Klatzkin is a musician of high accomplishment, having played in one of the largest theaters in Villna, Russian Poland, in Germany, France and England. Coming to New York, he was associated with prominent orchestras, being solo trumpeter for the Philharmonic Orchestra for seven years and playing with the Symphony Orchestra of that city, under Mangelberg and Bondansky; during the last ten summers he was soloist at Central Park, New York. He played for three years at the Columbia University, conducting his own band. He also taught at the Lachmund Conservatory of Music.

He has worked hard to organize an excellent band for Lake Harriet Pavilion and has secured the services of some of the best musicians in the city. He hopes to give Minneapolis music that is well worth listening to and has spared no time or effort to get the best available. He has also organized a sextette of singing artists, which he thinks will be a great addition to the evening concerts.

FOOD IN RUSSIA

In a letter describing the joy in a Russian town over the arrival of the food-packets of the A. R. A., which are sold at various agencies established by the J. D. C. the writer gives some idea of the terrific cost of food in that country. Here are a few

items (the figures are given in rubles): Milk, 15,000 a glass; flour, 75,000; sugar, 200,000; butter, 350,000; meat, 85,000; black bread, 30,000; white bread, 80,000; potatoes, 10,000; rice, 95,000; a pound, respectively; eggs, 25,000 each.

The value of a food-packet, based on present Russian exchange, would be 13,000,000 rubles. The J. D. C. sells them at \$10.00 each.

Kosher food-packets to the value of \$649,000 have been supplied through the J. D. C. since last November by persons having relatives in Russia.

General Julius Bauer has been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Field Marshal. He is the only Jewish general in the Hungarian army.

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
