Virginia, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—The music students of the Virginia high school will present "Sylvia," a two-act libretto, in the high school auditorium Dec. 1. Unusual talent has been found and developed in the music classes of the local school and its appearance in light opera is anticipated in the school. The title role will be sung by Lillian Kauppi.
