## Fish Fry Safe, Says Wires.

A mixture of Lester river water with city water containing chlorine eliminates any danger of fish fry dying. S. P. Wires, superintendent of the United States fish hatchery here, declared yesterday. He said at times city water is used entirely without affecting the trout fry. A report from Sturgeon Bay, Wis., indicated that 16,000 trout fry had died from water containing chlorine.
