Sues for Son's Death.

John Straub, father of Donald Straub, alleged to have been run over and killed by a taxi driven by George Flynn, Oct. 8, 1921, filed suit in superior court yesterday to recover \$10,000 damages for his son's death. The accident occurred between Seventh and Eighth streets on Cumming avenue. The lad died a few hours later at a local hospital. The case will be tried at the next term of the superior court.

Man Wins Divorce.
