Monday is the official "clean-up" day at all Superior schools. The pupils at all public institutions will be asked to help clean up the lawns and other school property as their portion of an effort to clean up Superior during official "clean up" week.

Guardian Petition Filed.

A petition and order seeking the appointment of Joseph A. Cohen, as guardian for Samuel Cohen, age 8, and authorizing the guardian to prosecute a damage claim against Oliver Rabideaux was filed yesterday with the clerk of superior court. The petition sets forth that Samuel Cohen received injuries in an automobile accident involving the defendant, Oct. 31, 1921.

Students Play, Raise Money.

A fete and "jinx" celebration was attended by Superior normal school students last night in the normal school recreation rooms. Booths were decorated in carnival colors and a side show atmosphere prevailed. All money derived will be placed in the athletic association fund, it was, announced.

Mayor Has Job Plan.

As a means to give work to unemployed residents at Itasca and Alouez, Mayor Fred Baxter announced yesterday that he would institute a 10-day rotation system as a substitute for a regular patrolman there. William Sliker, formerly on the beat in that locality, has handed in his resignation. Contending that civilians working in 10-day periods can handle the work, Mayor Baxter recommended his rotation plan to Arthur Buchanan, chief of police.

Divorce Petitions Denied.

Petitions for two divorces were denied by Judges W. R. Foley and Solon L. Perrin, in circuit and superior courts yesterday. Both plaintiffs charged cruel and inhuman treatment. Judge Perrin of superior court denied the petition of Ernest Dyer from Gena Dyer and Judge Foley in circuit court denied the plea of Helga Bernard for a divorce from Arthur Bernard.

Attorneys Sue for Fees.

A suit to recover \$5,387.30, alleged to be due as attorneys' fees, was filed yesterday with the clerk of superior court by Hanitch, Hartley, McPherson & Johnson against J. L. Davidson and J. R. Smith, doing business as the J. R. Smith company. The complaint alleges that the sum is due for services from Jan. 1, 1921, to Jan. 19, 1922.
