
Several of the teachers of the Ely schools are in attendance of the Minnesota Convention in Minneapolis.

DISTRICT LEGION AND AUXILIARY.

**MRS. PETER SCHAEFER AND
MRS. E. A. LABEAU RE
ELECTED TO OFFICES.**

The Eighth District Meeting of the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary convened in Duluth Friday and Saturday and the attendance was much larger than at any previous meeting. Friday evening the Legion entertained the visiting delegates with a social affair and a boxing show in which the experts of the many art of the entire district participated.

Saturday afternoon was taken up with informal committee meetings and sight-seeing trips to the steel plant and other places of interest at the Zenith City. Saturday evening a banquet of both the Legion and Auxiliary took place at the Chamber of Commerce with Warren E. Greene acting as toastmaster. Addresses were made at the banquet by Warren S. Jamar, commander of the David Wisted Post of Duluth, Paul O. Stone, commander of the Eighth District and Mrs. Peter Schaefer, president of the Eighth District Auxiliary. Musical numbers were also given and other entertainment features presented.

After the banquet the official meeting of the Legion Posts was held at the club rooms of the Duluth Post. Twenty Posts in the district were represented. A new amendment to the constitution, relative to representation, was introduced and final action will be taken at the meeting next month at Marble which was selected as the November meeting place. At that time it is expected Duluth will officially return to the district.

Mrs. Peter Schaefer was unanimously re-elected president of the Eighth District Legion Auxiliary and Mrs. E. A. LaBeau was also unanimously re-elected secretary-treasurer, thus honoring Ely and its Auxiliary Post. Mrs. G. P. Halvorson of Nashauk was elected vice-president.

Members of both the Legion and Auxiliary at the meetings Saturday afternoon and evening condemned the Federated Women's Clubs at Hibbing for their recent attack on the veterans of the World's War. The Federated Clubs had adopted a resolution severely criticizing Legionnaires "for using intoxicating liquors and creating disturbances" at Legion Conventions. Resolutions, worded in unmistakable language were adopted by both the Auxiliary and Legion at the meeting in which it was declared that responsibility for drunkenness and disturbances at Legion Conventions "was due to persons entirely outside the Legion, who take advantage of any convention to create disturbances and impressions that are contrary to the ideals and precepts of the American Legion." A copy of the resolution was ordered sent to the president of the Federated Clubs, to the headquarters of the Legion for Minnesota, to the press and to the American Legion Weekly.

Mrs. G. P. Halvorson of Nashauk was chairman of the committee that introduced the resolution at the Auxiliary meeting, the other members of the committee being Mrs. J. B. Graham and Mrs. Carrie A. Cox of Duluth and Mrs. R. P. Pearsall of Virginia. The resolution follows: "Whereas, it has come to the attention of the American Legion Auxiliary of the Eighth district, in convention assembled, of the action taken by the Minnesota Federation of Women's Clubs at its recent state convention, held at Hibbing, whereby a resolution was passed by that body in criticism of the American Legion men during their conventions, and "Whereas, We feel this criticism to be unjust, and "Whereas, The said resolution was published in several newspapers, thereby holding them up to public ridicule and condemnation. "Be it hereby resolved, That we enter protest to the action taken by your body and request that in justice to these loyal Americans, it rescind this action and that it will do all in its power to counteract the impression created."
