Mrs. Jaa. Moonan returned Monday from a two weeks visit with relatives and friends in the Twin Cities, St. Cloud and other cities.

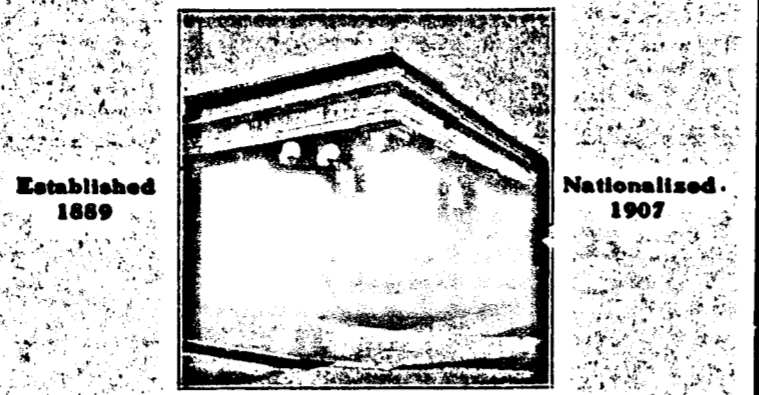
President Owen W. Parker of the Rotary Club attended the meeting of Rotary Club executives and secretaries in St. Paul last week.

CAMP ROOSEVELT AGAIN OPEN TO ELY BOYS.

Ely boys are again invited to attend Camp Roosevelt, the national summer educational training encampment at Silver Lake, near LaPorte, Indiana, under command of Major F. L. Beal, U. S. A. Word to that effect has just been received by Superintendent W. E. Englund of the public school system.

The first contingent will reach the camp for the opening of the summer on June 30, and will be followed by other groups on July 21 and August 4. The entire camp will close on August 16, giving from 600 to 800 boys opportunity to avail themselves of the courses in summer school, military training or Junior camp. Boys 10 to 18 years of age are eligible to attend.

Camp Roosevelt is attracting nation-wide attention because of its unique policy for giving boys, on the basis of a public institution, a course of highly specialized training, excellent care and food equal to that of the finest private camps. This is made possible through the support of the Chicago public school system, the War Department, Red Cross, Y. M. C. A., and public-spirited business men who bear all financial burdens. A three weeks outing under finest possible conditions, costs each recruit \$33.00 for the training, mess, and healthful outdoor vacation.

Major Beal, who is supervisor of physical and military training in the Chicago public high schools, and whose office is at 460 South State Street, Chicago, is busy perfecting arrangements for the comfort of the first contingent. According to the enrollment so far this year, all previous attendance records will be smashed.
