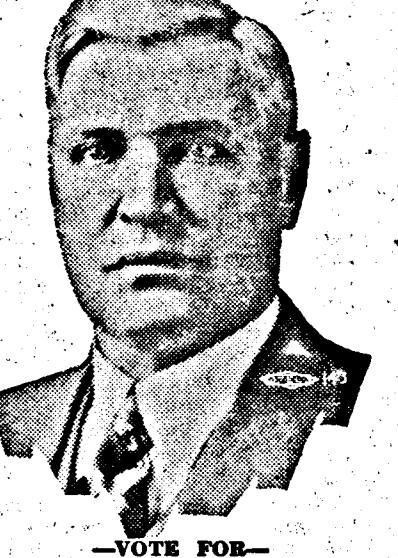

The Executive Officer of the State Sanitary Board has advised the Health Officer of this city that rabies still exist in St. Louis County, and that it is necessary to have all dogs in Ely effectively muzzled.
