

FEEDING SCHOOLS LISTED FOR MORTON

County Agent Newcomer Will Stress Fattening of Livestock at Seven Points

Morton county extension service is putting on a series of livestock feeding schools, the first of which will be held at Hebron Thursday, January 24. R. O. Newcomer, county agent, announces. The following day another demonstration will be held at Glen Ullin, and other towns to be school points include Judson, Mandan, Almont, Plasher, and New Salem.

The Hebron feed school will be held in the city hall from 10 a. m. to noon and from 1 to 3 p. m. Walter Klieck and George Urban, Hebron, are assisting Newcomer in arrangements. S. G. Denner, state agent in livestock, state college, Fargo, and J. Earl Cooke, extension worker of the Mandan Creamery and Produce company, will also assist.

County Agent Newcomer will stress feeding methods for beef and dairy cattle at the schools, but the feeding of other livestock will be discussed. Charts, illustrations, statistics and problems will be used in the lectures.

October 15 Is Date for U's Homecoming

Grand Forks, N. D., Jan. 17.—October 15, 1929, has been set as the date for the next Homecoming celebration at the University of North Dakota, according to an announcement today from the office of President Thomas F. Kane.

The University of South Dakota football team will clash with the Fickertville in Memorial stadium as the feature attraction of the celebration. Plans for other features more extensive than in past years are already being made.

More than 8,000 people were on the University campus Homecoming day this year and plans will be made to receive a still larger crowd next fall.

AL SMITH APPEALS FOR CONTRIBUTIONS

New York, Jan. 17.—(P)—Alfred E. Smith has asked popular contributions to liquidate the \$1,500,000 deficit incurred by the Democratic party in his unsuccessful campaign for president.

In a radio address last night Mr. Smith deplored the practice of a few rich men meeting party deficits and also urged the need for continued activity of the party throughout the four years between national elections.

He said he had agreed to turn over royal rights to a book of his campaign speeches to the national committee as his contribution to the party war chest. Copies of the book will be sent to each contributor who sends in two dollars or more toward meeting the deficit.

An important function of a minority party, Mr. Smith said, was to keep the people informed on what projects were being made toward the solution of national problems as unbiased information could not be had from the party in power.

For this purpose he emphasized the need for year-around headquarters for the Democratic national committee.

Mr. Smith omitted any reference to his own political future.

UNIFORM TIME FOR STATE URGED AGAIN

Senator Martin Would Have Points West of Missouri Have Central Time

Another battle to place standard time belt loomed in the North Dakota legislature Wednesday. Senator Martin, Morton county, presented the bill today and it was sent to committee where the argument probably will be open late this evening. A similar bill failed a pass in the house at the last session after a hard contest, losing by a narrow margin. At present that part of North Dakota lying east of the Missouri river uses Central standard time. Mount-tala time begins west of the river. Senator Patten, Mountrail county, tossed another farm storage bill into the hopper. This one would classify the farmer's granary, under certain conditions, as a bonded warehouse in which he could store grain and obtain money on storage tickets issued in accordance with the law. It also would extend to farm storage of agricultural products other than grain. One grain storage bill already has been introduced by Senator Tofrud of Pierce county.

A bill to appropriate \$35,000 for a bridge across the Red river east of Grafton was presented by Senator Murphy, Walsh county. Six other appropriation bills were introduced by the appropriations committee. These provided \$50,000 for wolf and magpie bounties; \$6,000 for the refund of money erroneously paid to the state general fund; \$2,000 for the North Dakota firemen's association; \$687 for the board of veterinary medical examiners; \$70,000 for the national guard and \$5,000 for the state minimum wage department.

Les McDonald, Mandan, was named clerk of the appropriations committee and O. T. Haakson, Barton, was elected clerk of the judiciary committee.

The senate also approved arrangements for committee rooms, which will be located in a local hotel.

Fargo, N. D., Jan. 17.—(AP)—Merging for the mutual benefit of both organizations, the board of directors of the North Dakota Co-operative Wool Marketing Association voted to affiliate itself with the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative union.

The wool men's association will continue under its present name, George P. Wolf, president of the association, stated, but slight changes in its constitution and by laws will be made to meet organization requirements of the Farmers' union.

Hebron Will Vote on Water System

Hebron is to vote, Wednesday, January 30, on a proposal to bond for the establishment of a municipal water supply system. The plans have been drawn by T. R. Atkinson, Bismarck engineer. They propose erecting a 75,000-gallon tank on a 90-foot tower on Neihardt hill in the northern end of the town. Eight-inch mains will distribute the supply to and along Main street.

Permits to issue motor transportation service, issued by the commission to Luther Lemons, Cogswell, and John A. Hansen, Tuttle, were canceled because of their failure to comply with the commission's requirements with regard to insurance.

The Greyhound Transportation company of Fargo was authorized to establish Sunday services on its passenger bus line operating between Fargo and Jamestown. The present service is daily except Sunday.
