

TENSENESS FELT AS NATIONALISTS TAKE WUHAN CITY, WUSUEH

Situation in Chinese Area is Believed to Be Approaching Crisis

Nanking, March 29.—(AP)—Chinese Nationalist soldiers, moving to put down the movement in the Wuhan cities of Wuhan, Hubei, have captured the city of Wusueh, inflicting sharp losses on Wuhan troops there. Wusueh is in Hubei, on the Yangtze River, between the Wuhan cities and Nanking.

Hankow, China, March 29.—(AP)—Dispatches reporting the capture of Wusueh by the Nationalist forces have treated a feeling of tense in the Wuhan cities, center of the opposition to the Nationalist central government. The public tension was increased because of reports coming in that the Nationalist troops were advancing up the Yangtze river from Wusueh. The Wuhan leaders are sending additional troops down the river in an attempt to block the Nationalist advance and a sharp engagement is expected.

Crisis is Approaching
Every indication that the situation in the area was approaching a crisis in the struggle between the Nationalist government and the Wuhan opposition. However, it was understood that the Wuhan leaders have completed plans for the evacuation of Hankow and a withdrawal across the Yangtze to consolidate their positions in Hunan, not considering the loss of the Wuhan cities as vital. The provinces of Hunan, Kwangsi and Kwangtung are regarded as the real heart of the "Wangsi" group.

Business Circles Object
Business circles in Hankow have been angered by the demand of the military chiefs here for \$5,000,000 Mexican as a war fund of which the Chinese banks were assessed \$2,000,000 Mexican.

Naples, March 29.—(AP)—Fire destroyed the sepulchre effigy representing Christ's tomb in the center of the Basilica of Santa Maria Nova today, just as the priests were preparing to celebrate Good Friday mass.

'Prisoner Escape' Case Transferred To District Court

Grand Forks, N. D., March 29.—(AP)—Larry O'Connor was held to district court today on a charge of permitting Rube Lukkason, convicted bootlegger, to escape March 16. O'Connor did not take the stand. A motion by the defense for dismissal at the conclusion of the state's testimony was denied by Police Magistrate Leslie Ryan. Lukkason is still at large.

O'Connor, a farmer living near here, was a special deputy sheriff. Lukkason was released in his custody at O'Connor's request.

NORTH DAKOTA GIVES 4 CENTS PER CAPITA IN XMAS SEAL DRIVE

Burling County, With 9.1 Cents per Capita Record, Second in State

Despite the fact that the 1928 Christmas seal sale conducted by the North Dakota Tuberculosis Association was hindered by the influenza epidemic and bad weather, the state subscribed a total of \$28,749.95, or more than 4 cents per capita, in the drive.

This was announced this morning by Miss Helen Katen, Bismarck, executive secretary of the organization.

The total this year represents a gain of \$781.68 over that of last year, which was \$28,968.27. North Dakota is in the top 30 states in the per capita contest in the nation, Miss Katen announced.

The first seal sale in North Dakota in 1909 netted only \$940.10.

Burling County, with a per capita record of 9.1 cents, was second in the contest of the 53 counties in the state. It was followed by Grand Forks, with 8.3 cents, won first honor.

Other counties whose per capita record was over 5 cents follow: Slope, Bowman, Grand Forks, McKenzie, Cass, Nelson, Dickey, Ward, and Towner.

County records follow: Over 4 cents—Ramsey, Golden Valley, Stutsman, Williams, Bottineau, Barnes, Divide, Steele, Benson, Billings, Emmons, and Sioux; over 3 cents—Eddy, Ransom, Pierce, Walsh, Burke, Grant, Traill, Cavalier, Wells, Kidder, Grand, Pembina, McLean, Sargent, Adams, McHenry, Dunn, and Rolette; over 2 cents—Morton, McIntosh, Mountrail, Hettinger, McHenry, Oliver, Richland, Logan, Stark, Foster, Sheridan, and Mercer.

Noteworthy, according to Miss Katen, is the fact that every county surpassed the mark of 2 cents per capita.

Seven counties showed a greater percentage of gain over their past five-year average sale. They are: McIntosh, 94.8 per cent; E. E. Gloege, chairman; Stark, 89.3 per cent; H. O. Pippin, chairman; Pierce, 83.7 per cent; Leonard, chairman; Cass, 72 per cent; Mrs. Alvina Wick, chairman; Grant, 68.2 per cent; Wilda Sebastian, chairman; Emmons, 67.4 per cent; Curtis Jenkins, chairman; and Walsh, 50 per cent; Benjamin Rinde, chairman; McIntosh wins the Elsie Hackey White cup.

Cass county led the total sale with \$2,486.44, followed closely by Grand Forks, Burling, Ward, and Stutsman counties.

Funds received in the sales drive will be used for school nursing work, school health equipment, nutrition work in schools, correction of physical defects, endowment of free beds at Camp Grassick, health habit materials for school use, health exhibits and contests, clinics, slides, films, posters, plays, oral hygiene work.

Miss Katen and Mrs. E. J. Taylor, Bismarck, made a trip to Camp Grassick, situated on the banks of Lake Isabel near Dawson, yesterday to begin arrangements for the 1929 open-air camp.

TEXAS AND PACIFIC RAIL MEN TO STRIKE

Dispute Begins When Railroad Moves Division Point in Texas

Texarkana, Ark., March 29.—(AP)—Local heads of the four big railroad brotherhoods had orders today to go out on strike tomorrow at 6 a. m. against the Texas and Pacific railroad. The dispute between the men and the company involving working conditions and a demand of the employees that they be reimbursed for property losses incurred in the transfer of the railroad's division point from Longview, Texas, to Mineola, Texas, last January. Many of the workers owned or were buying homes at Longview when they were forced to move. They insist that the company should assist them in the disposal of the property and protect them from losses.

Chicago, March 29.—(AP)—The lake water diversion hearing, held to determine how long Chicago should have to complete its sewage plant building program, was adjourned today, with counsel for the six lake states and the sanitary district satisfied with the new opinion. Chicago's use of Lake Michigan water for sewage purposes scored a point today at the lake level hearing before Charles Evans Hughes, special master in chancery.

Major Putnam Questioned

Major Rufus Putnam, one of the special consulting engineers hired by the sanitary district for this hearing, admitted on cross-examination that shipping on the Chicago river had steadily declined since diversion of lake water had been started.

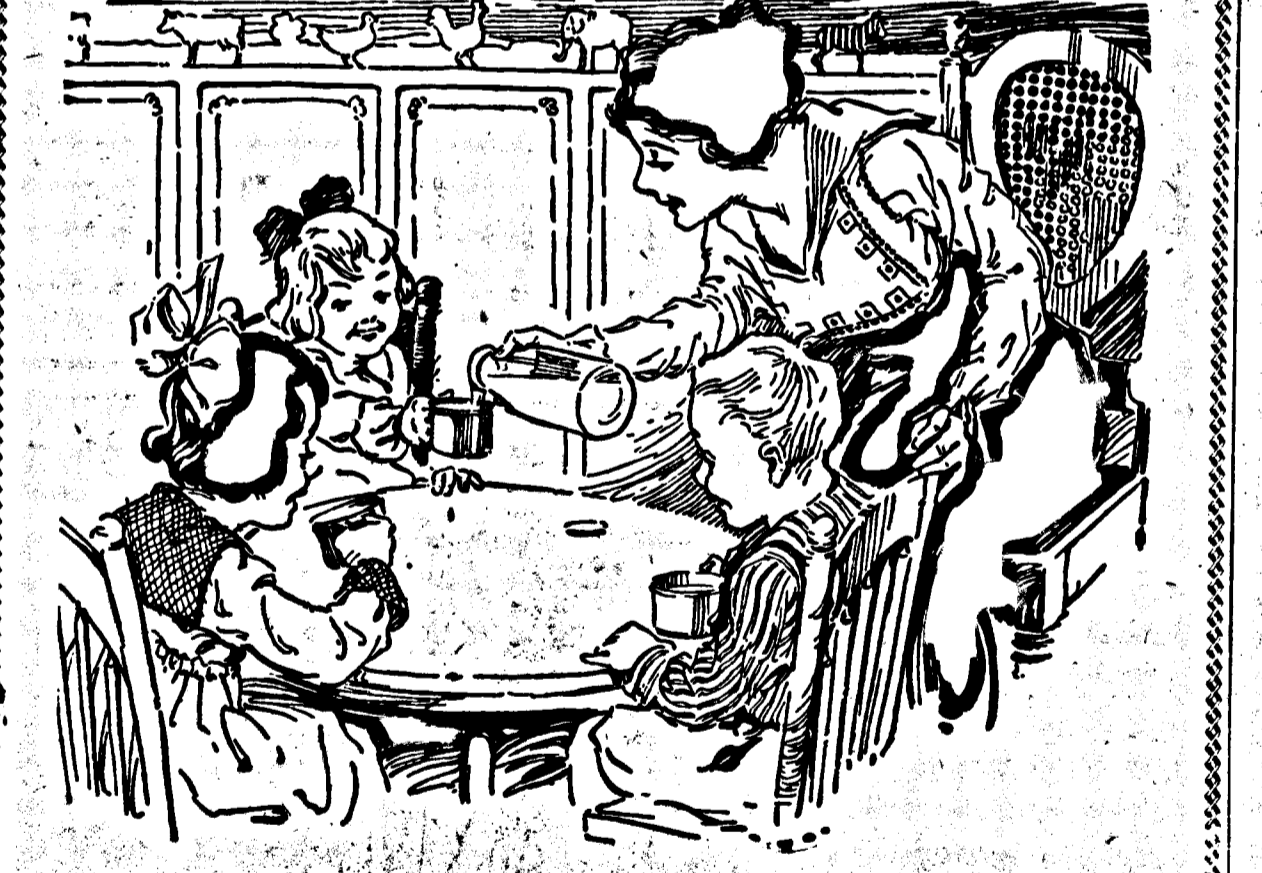
