

NEW PRICE RECORDS SET FOR LIVESTOCK AT FARGO 4-H MEET

Grand Champion Shropshire
Sheep Brings 83 Cents a
Pound in Sale

Fargo, N. D., Dec. 12.—(P)—Sale of livestock exhibits at the annual 4-H club achievement institute brought nearly \$5,000 today as bidders went in booming prices high above former totals.

Record prices were obtained in all three classes for the top notch animals. Frank Sorenson's grand champion shropshire sheep bringing 83 cents a pound when sold to the Reserve Packing company; Lucien Barnes' Fargo pride, champion Chester White Barrow, 40 cents from the Dakota Farmer; and Paul Hertzgard's champion shorthorn, 44 cents from the Powers Hotel, Fargo.

Reserve champions brought almost as good prices. The reserve lamb, owned by Frank Johnson, Casselton, bringing 35 cents per pound from the Fargo Forum; the reserve champion steer, owned by John McDonald, Jr., from the same company and the reserve champion Barrow, owned by Milton Williams, Arvilla, bringing 35 cents from the Grand Forks commercial club.

Heavy buyers were the Powers hotel, the Greater North Dakota association, the Northern Pacific Railroad company, the Northern States Power company and the Service clubs from both Fargo and Grand Forks.

Eddy Bostrop of Cuyahoga, who at the annual banquet Wednesday night hoped his pig would bring in enough to cover expenses to the institute despite the fact the animal did not take a prize, found many friends in the audience and the price offered shot up to 20 cents, considerable above amounts offered for some ribbon takers. He netted \$40.00, the Northern Pacific railroad taking the hog.

"Oh, Katherine, how could you do it? Pull the same trick again. You know I was broken hearted," he wrote on one note. On the other he said: "Oh, Katherine, you said you would be back in 15 minutes. I waited two hours."

Dickinson Isolation Hospital Is Opened

Dickinson, N. D., Dec. 12.—The Dickinson isolation hospital built by Stark county and the city of Dickinson at a cost of \$10,000 was opened this week. This fills a long felt need in the area and is of great importance to Dickinson and Stark county as a minimizer of contagion danger. Previously the hospital here could not admit contagious cases without danger to other patients in the hospital and the fact that Dickinson houses many students and workers in private homes such a building was found to be a necessity. The commissioners of the city and county made the funds available on agreement that the Catholic hospital here would operate the isolation hospital which is connected by tunnel with the hospital proper. It is one of the most complete isolation hospitals in North Dakota, erected so that the people of the entire Slope country may have adequate protection from contagious and infectious diseases.

Jamestown Debaters Face University Team

Jamestown, N. D., Dec. 12.—Jamestown college's debate squad, under the direction of Prof. J. C. Carey, opens its current campaign tonight with the University of North Dakota. The members of Jamestown's team—Mercedes Pitzer, Irwin Reiste and Donovan Sutton—will uphold the negative on the question: "Resolved, that nations should adopt complete disarmament except for such forces as are necessary for police purposes."

Richardton Youth, 15, Dies of Heart Trouble

Dickinson, N. D., Dec. 12.—The 15 year old son of Mrs. William Dahrmann died at the Richardson hospital early Wednesday of heart trouble and dropsy, from which he has suffered several months.

The family is one of the most prominent in the Richardson and Taylor communities, living on a farm north of Taylor.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced but burial will be in the German Evangelical cemetery of that community.
