Following will come an address by Rabbi Benjamin Fapernasser, Grand Rabbi, and a vocal solo by Dorena Markovits, Hallday. After another address by Cantor H. Macovee, Rabbi Rigler will give a short address and conduct the singing of the honors.

Next comes the opening of the Ark, when the cantor will sing, in Hebrew, and follow with a Biblical passage. The Hebrew prayer will be recited in English.

The second division of the ceremony begins with the march up the stairs taking place. The cantor will sing Psalm 122, and the Hebrew prayer will be recited in Hebrew will be given by Rabbi Meckler.

The third division is opened as the holder of the key to the synagogue opens the door. At this point the public will march into the temple. Singing of "Ma Tovu," a Biblical prayer, by Cantor Macovee, and the singing of the windows by Charles Rytzman, are the next events.
