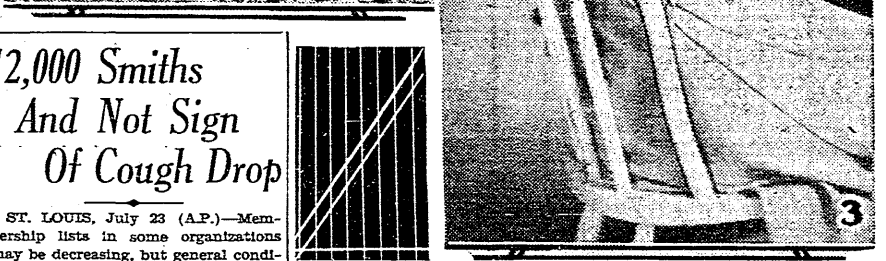

(Continued from Page One) since 1929 and involves a great deal of detailed work. In the event that he is able to do the work as he now does, he said, reductions should range between 8 and 20 percent on the assessed valuation, depending he made it clear, on the type of building being considered.

The reduction of about 22 percent in land assessments, as announced by Johnson last night, falls little short of his recent promises, he said, to cut the tax figures 25 percent. In many cases, Johnson pointed out, back country land already was assessed at a minimum and accordingly he was unable to make any further reductions.

Solvent credits of residents in the area included in the figures released last night, show an increase of more than \$100,000, although stocks, bonds and unsecured notes showed a decrease of about the same amount.

The total valuation of all property, except operative or public utility property, which is not taxable, shows a decrease of \$4,500,000, the assessor reported.

Figures, as released by the assessor, are subject to change by the board of supervisors, sitting as a board of equalization. This board has the power either to raise or lower assessed valuations.

WASHINGTON, July 23 (U.S.)—Suspension of all entries in the Chicago board of trade, largest grain futures exchange in the world, for 60 days beginning Aug. 7, was ordered today by the grain futures commission.

The commission, composed of three cabinet officers, Secretary of Agriculture Hyde, Secretary of Commerce Eastman and General Mitchell, upheld the complaint of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, a co-operative, that denial to it of access to the clearing privileges of the board constituted violation of the grain futures act.

Called Most Draastic The penalty considered the most drastic ever imposed upon a major commodity or security exchange in this country, followed suspension of the Uptake company, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Farmers' National, from board of trade privileges.
