Game, Fish Law Arrests Totaled For Last Year.

Law enforcement activities for 1933 summarized by the division of game and fish show that during the year 2,948 arrests were made and 1,398 seizures because of infractions of game and fish laws. Fines levied amounted to \$46,524.18.

Violation of fishing laws led the list with 885 arrests, small game law breaking second with 772 and guns illegally set up caused 407 arrests. Others were big game, 360; netting, 191; fur, 119; ducks, 61; carrying of firearms on game refuges, 59, and miscellaneous, 123.

Fines suspended totaled \$11,062.50 and fines for which jail sentences were served came to \$3,426, leaving a net amount of fines levied of \$4,231.68. A total of 11,646 days were served in jail by game and fish law violators during the year.

Game Protective League For Closed Duck Season.

Chief Warden William Hanson and Arvid Hessel of the State Fish and Game department at Winton and Sig Olson of this city, attended the meeting of the Minnesota Game Protective League held at Fergus Falls, Sunday and Monday.

Discarding the action taken by game officials from four northwest states for a 30-day national waterfowl season, the League went on record favoring a federally closed season for 1934.

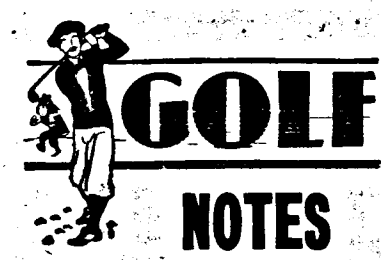
The thirty-day season recommendations were made on Sunday by conservation officials from Iowa, North and South Dakota and Minnesota in joint session with the League which led the minority vote for a national hunting holiday. A rather gloomy prediction was voiced at the meeting by Sam Anderson who declared, "at the present rate of annual depletion we won't have to conserve ducks 10 years from now—they won't exist."

Professional Auto Racers at Hibbing.

The greatest array of dirt track speed demons ever seen in the northwest is promised for the Fourth of July celebration at Hibbing next Wednesday.

The celebration is sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Hibbing while the Police Relief Association is sponsoring the auto races.

The open-to-the-world auto races are expected to attract many from this city. Already many entries have been received. Gus Schroeder, Sig Haugdel, former world's speed king and holder of many world records and Frankie Sands of Orr, Minnesota, Gopher State Champion and strong challenger for national honors, are among the stars scheduled for the afternoon race events at the St. Louis County Fair Grounds.

The races start at 2:30 o'clock with the times trials scheduled for 3 P. M. A dangerous and thrilling flaming board crash by Elfreida Mais, world's "Queen of Speed and Thrill Girl" will be an added sensation.

St. Louis County Has Had \$3,453,452 Road "Bonus."

St. Louis county has received \$3,453,452 more in expenditures on state trunk roads than it has paid into state highway funds through the gasoline tax and motor vehicle license fees. This is shown by a tabulation made by the highway department covering the period from 1921 to 1933, inclusive.

In those twelve years, the figures show, St. Louis County paid to the trunk highway fund \$12,265,306, while expenditures on trunk roads in the county totaled \$15,068,758. The expenditures include interest and principal payments on county reimbursement bonds assumed by the highway department.

Only six out of the state's 87 counties have paid more into the trunk funds than they have received in road ex-

penditures. Hennepin and Ramsey counties head this minority, but they have received vast benefits from the construction of trunk roads radiating from Minneapolis and St. Paul to other parts of the state.

In the case of Isanti, Pennington, Pipestone and Rice, the other counties which paid more than they received, various factors are responsible for the situation. Some have had an unusually small mileage of state trunk roads, a condition remedied by the recent expansion of the trunk system. There are also construction projects now pending in some of these counties which would more than balance the records. All of the four but Pipestone county have unpaid balances due on their county reimbursement bonds which the highway department must meet, as follows: Isanti, \$67,544; Pennington, \$27,814; Rice, \$150,684.

St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth are now receiving annual allotments from the Highway Department to care for streets used as trunk highways. Formerly such payments were not made.
