Mrs. Matt Hein and son, Charles, were in the city from Embarras last week.

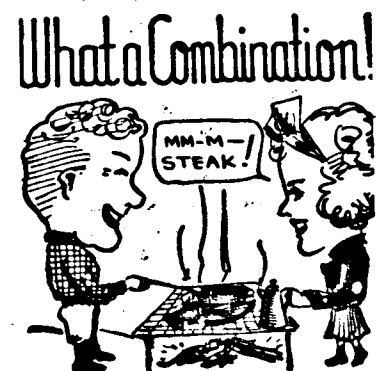

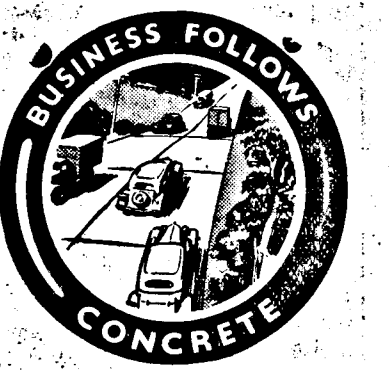

Christmas Seal Sale Opens After Meeting.

A first hand story of the battle being waged with microscope and test tube to solve the riddle of tuberculosis will be brought to Minnesota by Dr. Esmond R. Long of Philadelphia, who will be guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Minnesota Public Health Association to be held Friday, November 23, in the Twin Cities.

Dr. Long is a leader in the research work which is carried on continuously in sixteen laboratories throughout the United States under the auspices of the National Tuberculosis Association in an effort to find some specific cure or treatment for the disease. He is director of the laboratory of the Henry Phipps Institute for the study of Tuberculosis and Professor of Pathology at the University of Pennsylvania. A member of the Board of Directors of the National Tuberculosis Association for some years Dr. Long received the Trudeau medal for distinguished service in the research of the association in 1932.

The meeting, which will be preliminary to the opening of the 1934 Christmas Seal Institute at noon and the annual dinner at 6:30 P. M. at the Nicollet hotel in Minneapolis. Included among the dinner speakers will be Dr. E. L. Tuohy of Duluth, who will tell of the struggles of the pioneers in the Minnesota sanatorium movement, in connection with the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the first sanatorium in the United States, an event commemorated by this year's Christmas Seal. Dr. O. W. Farber is again in charge of the Seal Sale in this city.
