FOREST MAPS COTTAGE PLAN

Supervisor Harmon Announces Classification of Lakes in Superior Forest.

For some time it has been the aim of the Superior National Forest to map a long-time recreational plan for lakes in the forest.

Such a plan has been announced by Supervisor E. U. Harmon by which lakes easily accessible by roads would be classified separately for resorts, summer homes, public camping and picnic grounds and for organizations.

Each lake would be designated for a separate recreational class, such as one lake for resorts, another for summer homes having three rooms or more and another for a Girl Scout camp, according to Mr. Harmon.

A survey is being made of the entire forest to provide the forest service with data for launching the permanent program next year.

By this method the service hopes to make the forest more inviting to vacationist and outdoor lovers. The plan is intended to promote building of summer homes and resorts in this area.

The government will provide the roads to the lakeshore lots and will lease the land to builders for a nominal cost yearly. The forest service will not build any homes for rental purposes, he added.

Such classified lake will have sanitation, a water supply and fire protection.

At some lakes, one room cottages may be built while at others only resorts will be allowed. In this manner prospective residents will be assured that if they seek a quiet place for a summer home, there will be no possibility that a resort will be built on their lakeshore.

At lakes where large summer homes may be constructed, the forest service will not permit building of smaller cottages.

The camping and picnic grounds will include a beach and sanitation facilities and a water supply.

New Maps Being Made For Forest Service Use.

Many rivers have ceased to flow or have changed their courses, old lakes have dried up and new ones, formed since the first G. L. O. surveys were made over a century ago on wild lands now being brought under fire, protection forest management and administration within the boundaries of the national forest units of the north central region, under the direction of E. W. Tinker, regional forester.

Accurate maps must be prepared and title cleared before government improvements can be made and Forest Service draftsmen and engineers are finding they must work from surveys made from accurate compass and hand-made chains; the failure of pioneer surveyors to take into account the curvature of the earth's surface and the variations of the magnetic North Pole has sometimes resulted in one-fourth mile errors within a state-mile survey.

While George Washington made a good surveyor and statesman, forest service engineers are convinced that some of his contemporary surveyors of the territorial days must have played truant on surveying test days.

New base maps are being prepared, and after all inaccuracies have been noted in the field and corrections made, a new supply of maps will be printed, not only for use in forest regeneration but also for vacationists, resort owners and other forest users throughout the region.
