

TIMBER NEEDS CONSERVATION

Chief Forester Silcox Stresses Need of Federal Regulation to Preserve Timber.

Before a meeting of 200 state foresters, representatives of the government departments and members of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association...

Asserting the program "probably can't be handled wholly in the field of voluntary action," he outlined his three-point program for the conference to consider:

"Return to public ownership of more timber acreage, formation of special conservation practices and legislation with appropriations to prevent loss by fire and disease."

Arrowhead Will Make Exhibits at Jamboree.

Council name signs will be provided for each so they will be standard in size and kind. Those desiring to construct a unique, rustic council sign may do so.

Boys in charge of the respective troop exhibits should come prepared to set up the exhibit and bring tools or equipment necessary to properly set the same.

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prima facie evidence of a violation of this act.

In Section 5 it provides that where a particular trade or industry, of which the person, partnership, firm or corporation complained against is a member, has an established cost survey for the locality and vicinity in which the offense is committed, the said cost survey shall be deemed competent evidence to be used in proving the cost of the person, firm, or corporation complained against within the provisions of the act. It further provides that where such cost survey has established a fair and reasonable average cost of doing business for that particular trade or industry, such average cost shall be deemed prima facie evidence of cost of all individuals, firms or corporations of such trade or industry; and sales at prices less than actual replacement cost of the goods plus such average cost as described above, shall be deemed to be sales below cost, within the provisions of the act.

The cost of doing business or overhead expense is defined as the average of all costs of doing business incurred in the conduct of such business during the calendar year immediately preceding any alleged violation of the act. Heavy penalties can be incurred for violation of this act, and upon conviction the violator may be fined not less than \$200 nor more than \$1000 for each offense; or in default of payment of such fine, he may be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than three months nor more than one year.

Any aggrieved person, partnership, firm or corporation or trade association may maintain an action to enjoin a continuance of any act in violation, and if injured thereby may recover damages. If in such action the court shall find the defendant has violated any of the provisions, it shall enjoin the defendant from a continuance thereof. It shall not be necessary that actual damages to the plaintiff be alleged or proved. In addition to such injunctive relief, the plaintiff in such action shall be entitled to recover from the defendant actual damages. In any injunction proceedings brought, it shall be sufficient to allege and prove the unlawful intent of the person, firm or corporation for whom or for which he acts.

Frank Lindgren, state president of the Loyal Order of Moose, attended a meeting of the executive committee of the organization in West Duluth, Sunday, where arrangements were discussed for the annual state convention of the order to be held on July 23, 24 and 25 in that city.

Change Ordered in Color Of Town Direction Signs.

To conform with national regulations on color of uniform traffic control devices and to make them plainer to read, all signs directing traffic to cities or towns on state highways will be changed from white letters on a black background to black letters on a white background, according to an order by W. F. Rosenwald, chief maintenance engineer of the Minnesota Highway department. The change will come as the signs are reconditioned. Smaller reflector buttons, to improve daylight visibility of the black lettering, were also ordered. These signs are used principally where a state highway does not pass through the center of towns and a directional sign is desired to indicate the location of business districts.

POOR RELIEF CENTRALIZED

First Move in Centralization Plan by County Demotes Virginia Man.

The position of director for poor relief of northern St. Louis county, held by Walter Ehler at Virginia, was abolished by the county commissioners at their meeting last week.

This was the first of a series of steps planned to centralize and reorganize poor relief in the county in order to reduce administrative expenses in line with the expected drop in relief this spring and summer.

The change also affected Mrs. Florence Betchel, relief supervisor of the Virginia office. Her resignation was accepted and Mr. Ehler given the position with a reduction in salary from \$200 to \$150 monthly.

District supervisors, besides Mr. Ehler, will be Jule Johnston, in charge of the Hibbing office. They will be directly responsible to the poor commission headquarters in the Duluth courthouse which will have charge of direct relief in the county.

324 Driver Licenses Suspended or Revoked.

Three hundred and twenty-four motor vehicle drivers licenses were suspended or revoked in Minnesota in the first quarter of 1937, January, February and March, according to report by Gil Carmichael, director of the state drivers license bureau, to N. W. Elsborg, state highway commissioner. There were 71 revocations and 63 suspensions in March. Mr. Carmichael said. Of 183 revocations so far this year, 175 of them were for drunken driving, the report shows, and of 141 suspensions 90 were for reckless driving. Since the bureau was established in 1924, there have been 2,536 revocations and of these 2,423 were for drunken driving.

Ramsey county led in revocations in March with 24. Hennepin and St. Louis were tied for second with 10 each. Others were scattered through the state. Hennepin led in suspensions with 17. Ramsey was second with eight and Goodhue had five. Of March revocations, 66 were for drunken driving, three for failure to stop after an accident and two for manslaughter. Of licenses revoked in March, 70 were men and one a woman. Of suspensions, all 63 were men.
