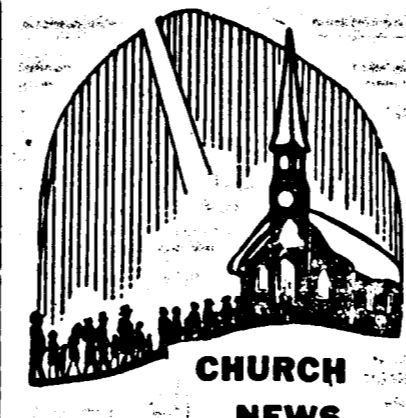


LOCAL ITEMS

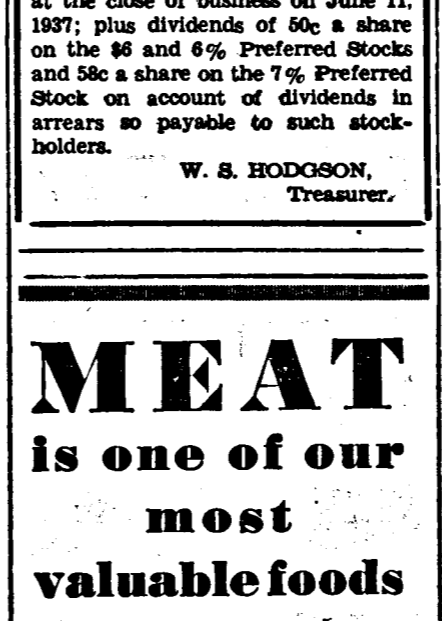
The Ladies Aid Society

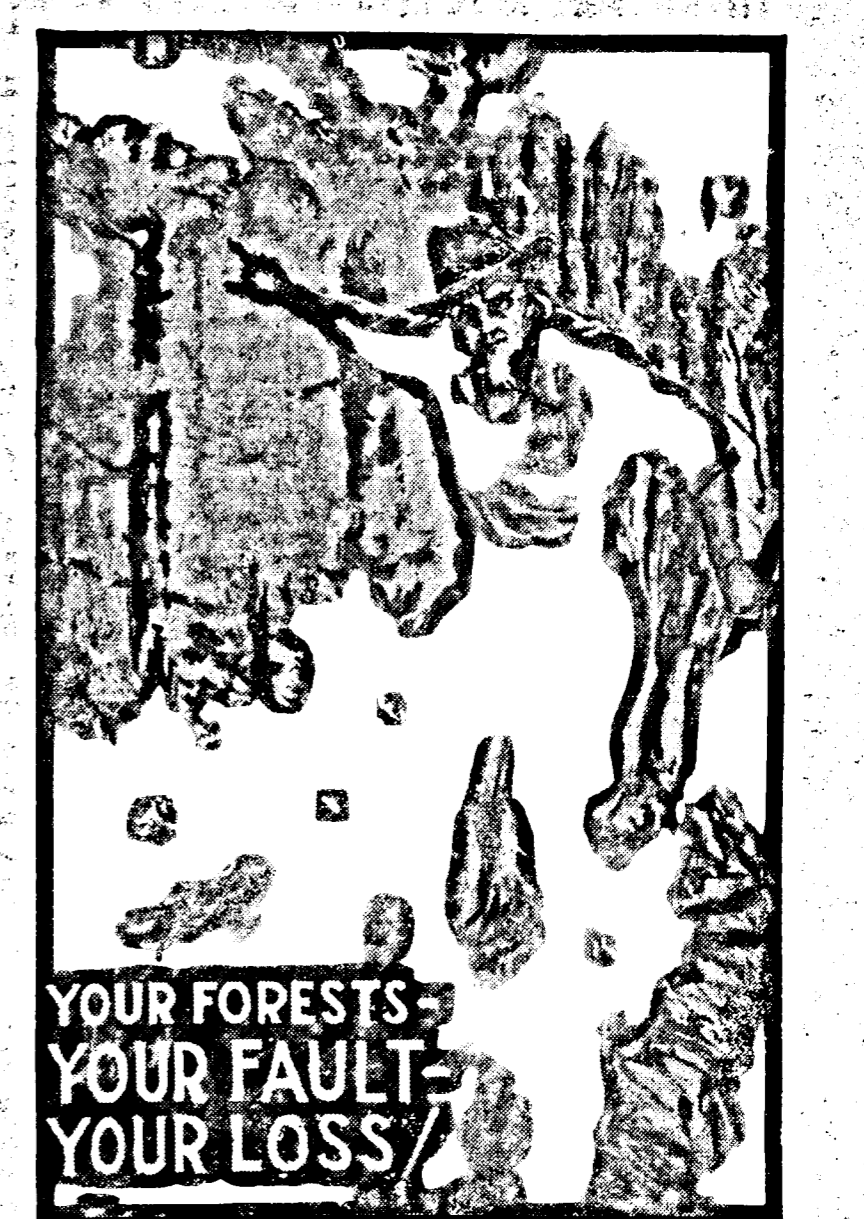

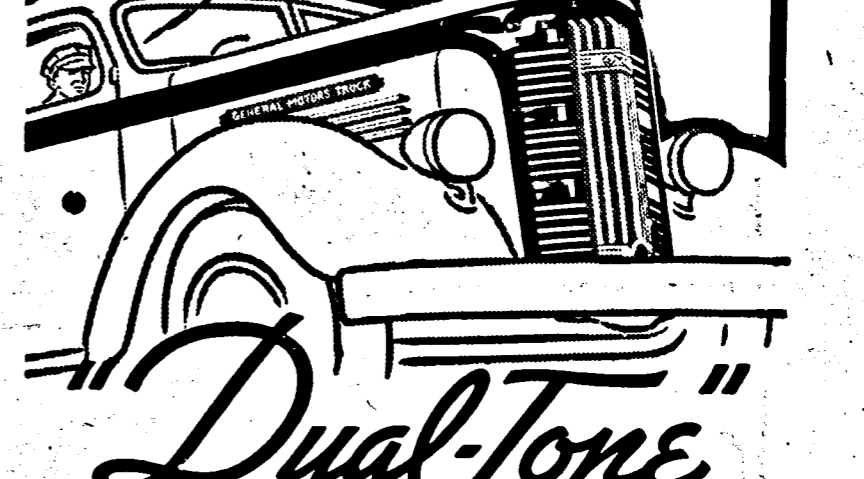

Noted Painter Aids Gov't. in War Against Forest Fires



YOUR FORESTS - YOUR FAULT - YOUR LOSS. To aid the Forest Service in its campaign to halt the vast economic and recreational losses that follow in the wake of forest fires that sweep over 40 million acres each year, James Montgomery Flagg, noted painter, has presented to the United States government an original painting as his personal contribution to the cause of fire prevention. The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced today. The painting depicts Uncle Sam in the uniform of a Forest Ranger pointing a finger toward a burning forest, over the title "Your Forests - Your Fault - Your Loss." It was Mr. Flagg's "I Want You" called by the contemporary press "the greatest war cartoon of all time," that established the familiar figure of Uncle Sam. More than four million copies of this work were distributed by the government and publications with a circulation of more than ten times that number reproduced it, many in full page size. The original painting now hangs in the Smithsonian Museum in Washington. Following the acceptance of the painting by President Roosevelt at the White House on June 10, "Your Forests - Your Fault - Your Loss" begins a nation-wide tour. Through the aid of cooperating agencies poster copies of the painting are to be distributed throughout the country. R. U. Harmon, supervisor of the Superior National Forest with headquarters at Duluth, commenting upon the forest fire prevention painting said: "Mr. Flagg has gone straight to the essential point in the problem of fire control—the human element. Annually carelessness with fire in the woods threatens the one remaining wilderness area in the middle west. Thousands of visitors use this area and enjoy the fishing, camping, canoeing, and other forms of recreation which are available to all. "A review of the fires which occurred last year, the most severe fire season in the history of the Superior National Forest, reveals that sixty-nine were caused by man, hence were preventable. Smokers who carelessly threw away burning matches and cigarette butts and campers who left their campfires unattended were the worst offenders, causing a total of fifty-one fires. Many of those fires occurred in inaccessible areas where great difficulty was encountered in transporting sufficient men and equipment to quickly extinguish these blazes and much valuable timber and wild life was destroyed. "Inasmuch as the National Forests are public property, it may reasonably be said that when a forest burns, everybody loses. Mr. Flagg has made a valuable contribution in the fight against forest fires which last year on the Superior National Forest burned over an equivalent of forty square miles."
