Jimmy Adamek will be trying for his fiftieth knockout at Olympia tonight and Kayo Morgan will be trying to get somebody into the ring with him before cools, or bronchitis, or fallen arches forces another postponement or substitution.

Adamek, the Midland Mauler, meets Eddie Mader, New York heavyweight, in a scheduled 10-round bout.

Morgan, originally scheduled to fight Sixto Escobar, former bantamweight champion of the world, meets Henry Hook, dubbed the "Hoosier Howitzer," in another 10-round.

There are three other bouts on the card, including a total of 38 scheduled rounds of boxing, and the appearance of Gerald Walker, deposed Tiger outfielder, as a second in the corner of Kayo Morgan.

Escobar, who five times now has been scheduled to meet Morgan without a successful culmination of the bout, is confined to his room with bronchitis. Three doctors—Dr. S. L. Grekin, Dr. Seth W. Ellis and Dr. Jose Guerrero—examined Escobar at 10 o'clock yesterday in the presence of Commissioner Frank MacDonell and concurred that he would be unable to go through with tonight's bout.

Henry Hook, who is managed by Billy Stephens, former Chicago newspaperman, is 25 years of age, born in Indianapolis. He is classed as the seventh ranking bantamweight of the world. Morgan is rated No. 2.

"I'll get you before Christmas time," Hemans is quoted as yelling at Kipke.

Asked about the Hemans episode, Kipke said:

"I think it would be in bad taste for me to say anything." Former players under Kipke, including Stan Fay and Chuck Bernard, came to his defense.

"He was one of the greatest fellows any boy could play for," said Stan Fay. "He taught you more than just football. He taught you sportsmanship and the benefits of clean living. I'm sorry to see 'Kip' leave Michigan."

Earl (Dutch) Clark, coach of the Lions, said:

"I was under the impression Kipke would remain at least one more year. Michigan was just coming out of the slump. It was fairly well agreed the material next year at Michigan would have been better."

Joe Gembis, mentioned as a possible successor to Kipke at Ann Arbor, said:

"Harry was backfield coach at Michigan in 1927, one of the years I played out there. He was a help to me then, a great help. He's been most kind to me since I took over this job at Wayne University."

HARRY BENNETT BITTER
Harry Bennett, personnel director of Ford Motor Car Company, was bitter at Kipke's treatment.

"Last year on Christmas Eve they broke a story that Kipke was through. This year they waited about as close to Christmas as they could. I thought in any business an honorable man was given a chance to resign and seek another job before his firing was plastered all over the papers for the world to see.

"The whole thing seems malicious to me. It's politics, and nothing else. Kipke stands for everything that's clean and fine in sports. But maybe Michigan doesn't want that. I'm inclined to wonder."

Reynolds Pins Bauer Quickly

Jack Reynolds, champion welterweight wrestling champion, celebrated his return to Detroit after a three-year absence by impressively defeating his challenger, Joe Bauer, in almost record time. The match took place at Naval Armory last night.

Reynolds won in two straight falls, taking the first in 11 minutes and the second in less than two minutes, thus disposing of the tough Bauer in less than 13 minutes. In both cases the champ employed the Japanese leg lock, a maneuver that has stood him in good stead for several years. Jack looked like a better wrestler than when last here, proving that 'age could not wither nor time destroy his infinite variety.'

In the second half of the double wind-up Chief Thunderbolt and Johnny Stote went to a draw after each had won a fall. The time limit expired after five minutes of wrestling in the third chapter, when neither could gain a fall.

The Chief had taken the first in 22 minutes with a "pump handle" hold and Stote won the second in 7:25 with a Japanese spinner.

Buzz Reynolds didn't do as well as his noted uncle as the best he could do was a 20-minute draw with Dick Gerber. In the opening bout Freddie Knickles won over Gordon Arquette in 8:17 with kangaroo kicks.

Colt Swimmers Lose First in 8 Years

Northwestern High's remarkable record of not having lost a dual swimming meet in eight years was ended by Redford yesterday as the Huskies triumphed, 48-36, in the Redford pool.

Opposed by the best swimming team in Redford history, the Colts dropped five of the eight events, the Huskies taking the lead in the third event, the 220-yard free style, and holding it to the finish. Before yesterday Northwestern had gone undefeated in dual competition since a defeat by Northern in 1929. The Colts are the present Metropolitan League champions.

Irving (Monk) Taylor paced Redford with two firsts, taking the 220 free style and the 150 individual medley relay. Pat Bradley and Pat Stove won other firsts for Redford and the Huskies wound up with a first in the medley relay.

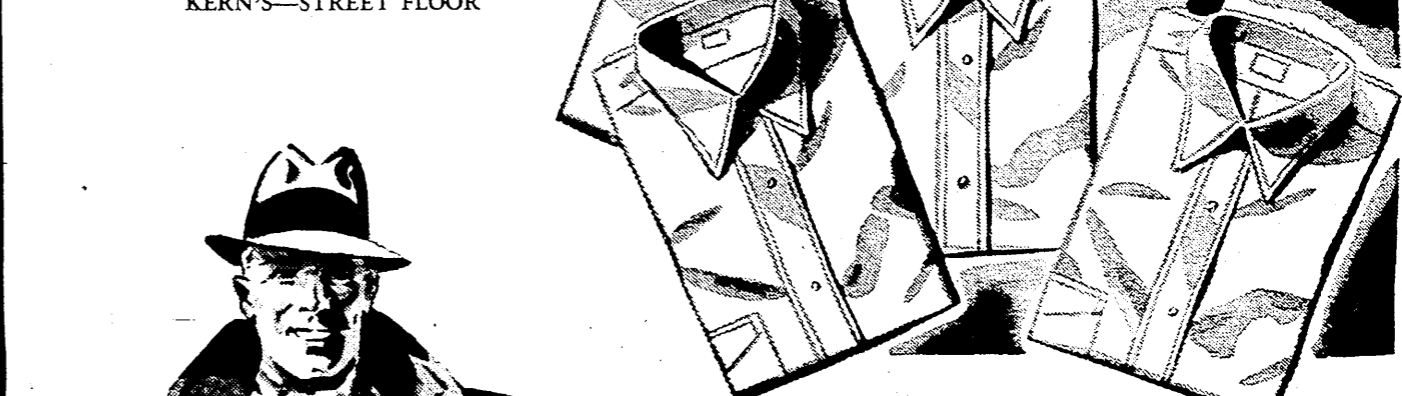
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
