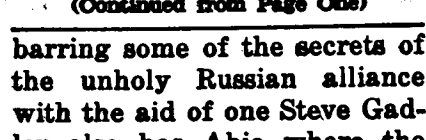

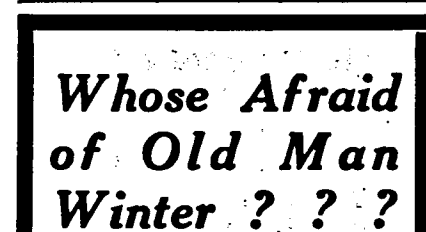

ELY DEFEATS AURORA, 21-0

Final Game of Year Won in Hectic Struggle Marked by Numerous Penalties.

Ely won its final football game of the year, 21-0, at Aurora Wednesday morning in a hectic struggle marked by an unusual large number of penalties for everything from being off side to participating in a fight that the officials saw fit to inflict against the local team. William Mills, center, and Brattien, center for Aurora, were ejected from the game in the second quarter for squaring off at each other.

Albert Banks went over for the first marker in the initial quarter, with Rowe, who replaced Leonard Tomisch in the backfield because of injuries, converting the extra point. Paul Prola reeled off a 40-yard run in the third quarter for the second touchdown, with Banks making the extra point. George Tuomala scored the final six points in the last quarter and Banks converted the point after touchdown.

Ely attempted two passes, both incomplete, while Aurora tossed 16, four of them good for 7, 5, 8, and 15 yards, respectively. Ely made 14 first downs, while the losers had five to their credit. Handberg replaced Moeding, who is also on the injured list, in the line.
