## HOOP ARTISTS START WORK

High School Faces 12-Game Schedule; Jaysees to Play Ten Games.

Ely high school and Junior College basketball squads inaugurated work-outs this week under the guiding hand of Coach Ed. T. Buckley in preparation for the season's opening games three weeks distant. Both teams start hostilities at Eveleth, Friday, Dec. 2.

The high school's 12-game schedule and the Junior College's lineup of 10 games should provide basketball fans with plenty of excitement. The former has five games set for the home court, with Aurora, Eveleth, Virginia, Biwabik and Tower, and the latter also has five home games with Virginia, Hibbing, Eveleth, Duluth, and Itasca.

Both of last year's squads were hit by graduation, leaving Coach Buckley the eternal job that faces every coach, that of developing suitable material to fill the shoes of a good share of his best men.

Tony Stukel and Ed Buckley, Jr., guards; William Loushin, center, and Joe Perko, forward, left man-sized jobs for someone to fill on the high school team as did John Stukel, center, and Joe Garni, forward, on the Jaysee squad. These men were lost through completion of their scholastic work.

Alvin Grank, center, and John Zale and Ed Olosh, guards, and Leonard Tomisch and Tony Markun, forwards, who saw service on last year's high school team, are on deck again this season.

On Matt Mayeria, Milton Stenlund and Sylvester Yuma, guards; Jack Gianotti and John Pechek, centers, and Joe Novak, Joe Fink and Stanley Sustereich, forwards, veterans from last year, will fall the task of bringing in the bacon for the Junior College. Yuma may be lost through ineligibility because of the three-year competition rule.

## ELY ON TRAFFIC HONOR LIST

One of Thirteen Cities in 5000 Population Class Without Traffic Fatality.

Eleven Minnesota counties and 13 cities with populations over 5,000 covered themselves with traffic glory by keeping death off their streets and highways during the first nine months of this year, according to the report of the safety division of the Minnesota Highway department.

Another interesting sidelight of the report was that while deaths increased 15 per cent above last year in the cities, in the rural areas the increase was only 2.4 per cent.

The eleven honor counties with spotless records are: Hubbard, Red Lake, Mahanomen, Lake of the Woods, Nobles, Sibley, Cottonwood, Roseau, Lincoln, Rock and Stevens. Each of the counties mentioned had one or more traffic fatalities in 1937.

The honor cities for the nine-month period are Ely, Wadena, Austin, Virginia, Fergus Falls, Chisholm, Eveleth, Crookston, Willmar, Columbia Heights, Fairmont, International Falls and Little Falls. Of this favored group, Eveleth, Willmar, Ely, Columbia Heights, Fairmont, International Falls and Little Falls had spotless records in 1937.

Of the three cities of the first class, Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth, St. Paul had the best safety record for the nine months. Duluth the worst. For the period the St. Paul fatality total was 30, Minneapolis' 65, and Duluth's 15.

### Complete Deer Census in Territory Near Here.

Six areas in the LaCroix ranger district and one in the Fernberg, each a section in size, were thoroughly covered by COC boys last week in taking the annual deer census sponsored by the U. S. forest service. In these seven sections, laid out so as to include every type of ground from swamp to high land, the counts are taken, and from them the average for the entire district is estimated.

All other wildlife seen was also counted, which included several varieties of grouse, porcupines, rabbits, one skunk, spruce hens and bears. The bears were spotted in the immediate vicinity of the Fortage River COC camp. No fox were observed, something considered very unusual.

This year during the deer and bear season cooperative checking stations will again be maintained by the forest service at various points where traffic enters and leaves the woods. In filling out the blanks, hunters will be asked to give their residence, total days hunted, locality where deer or bear was killed, if deer is killed, its sex, age, class, and weight are asked for, whether the hunter believes there is an increase or decrease of deer, the number seen dead, and the number of wounded that escaped; in case of a bear, its weight and sex are requested.

### To Make Twenty-first Hunting Trip Together.

Ten men, four of them from Minneapolis, two from Pine City, and four from Ely, will make their twenty-first trip together into the Stony country after deer, leaving Saturday afternoon. Another Ely resident will accompany them for his twelfth trip.

They will make their headquarters in their cabin, which they have named "Spike Doe" camp, on Wampus lake, from which they will travel forth early Tuesday morning and for nine mornings thereafter in search of the fleet-footed deer. The names of both the camp and the lake were derived from adventures, exciting to say the least, that the group has experienced during their many sojourns in the heart of this deer country.
