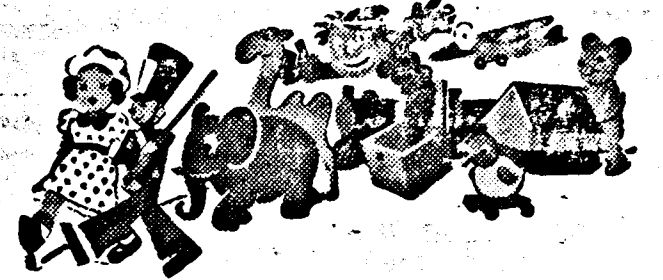

GIVE FIGURES ON DEER HUNT

District Isaac Walton's Pass Resolution Favoring Quo-quo-Superior Plan.

Sixty-five per cent of the hunters who participated in the big game hunt were successful in getting their deer, Herman Olson, of the U. S. forestry department told 150 Isaac Walton's gathered in the Medical Arts building in Duluth Saturday for their district meeting.

A resolution favoring the Quo-quo-Superior forest program was adopted by the organization. Sigurd F. Olson of this city discussed the situation.

Of the deer killed during the 10-day season, 35 per cent were does, 36 per cent adult bucks, 8 per cent spotted bucks and the remaining 21 per cent, fawns, the forestry representative stated. A total of 4,500 deer were killed, as compared with 4,000 in 1936 and 4,040 in 1937. Data was gathered by CCC enrollees.

The Ely Junior College dean was elected as one of the vice presidents of the district group. Byron Carlson was elected as a director. Wesley Libbey of Grand Rapids is the new president.

Collapse of Ford's Theater Floors

REGULAR MEETING.

The matter of awarding prizes for the best decorated business house and best decorated home was discussed. It was moved and supported that prizes be offered in amounts of \$20.00, \$10.00 and \$5.00 for the business houses and for \$15.00, \$10.00 and \$5.00 for homes. The motion carried.

It was moved and supported that John Wilmunen be made chairman of a committee to arrange for this contest and that he pick the rest of the committee. Carried.

Pete Retains Lead Over Veranth in Vote Recount.

Jacob L. Pete still held a lead of about 30 votes over his opponent Joseph Veranth after the ballots cast for fourth district commissioner had been recounted. The recount ended Saturday afternoon, one week after it had started.

About 100 ballots had been kept out, however, awaiting the decision of the district court judge as to their validity. Until he completes this work, which is expected to be this weekend, the results of the recount will not be known.

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
