**Recipes for Menus of Popular Hostesses**

Here are the recipes for the dinner menu served by Mrs. Donovan and the luncheon menu served by Mrs. Worcester:

**Chicken Gumbo—**  
Combine 1 can of okra, ¼ cup of rice, ¼ can of tomatoes, 3 cups of thick chicken stock, ¼ cup of chopped celery and 2 cups water. Heat thoroughly and serve.

**Fried Chicken—**  
Clean and joint a 3 pound chicken. Dry and season with salt and pepper. Roll in flour. Fry slowly in half lard and half butter. Keep covered while cooking.

**Spinach Ring—**  
Carefully wash 4 pounds of spinach and soak in cold water. Lift out of water and place in sauce pan. Cook without any water until tender. Cut up finely when cooked and add 1 tablespoon of gelatin dissolved in a little water. Place in hot mould. When ready to serve cover with a sauce made of rich cream sauce, 1 tablespoon of honey, hard boiled egg chopped up.

**Sweet Potatoes in Orange Cups—**  
Boil sweet potatoes and mash with butter, nutmeg, salt and pepper. Fill orange cups with mixture and top with marshmallows. Brown marsh- mallows lightly in oven and serve.

**Corn Sticks—**  
Use 2 cups of southern corn meal 1 cup of milk (more if necessary), 2 teaspoons of baking powder, ½ teaspoon salt, 1 egg and 1 tablespoon of butter or shortening. Beat well. Pour in well buttered iron corn stick pans and bake in moderate oven.

**Peach Cobbler—**  
Line a baking dish with regular pie crust and then pour 1 or 2 cans of halved peaches over it. Juice and all. Add 2 cups of water, 2 tablespoons of butter, ¼ teaspoon of nutmeg and ¼ cup of honey. Cover with top crust and bake until a light brown.

**Sweetbread Timbales—**  
Cook 2 tablespoons butter with 1 sliced onion five minutes. Add ½ cup mushroom caps finely chopped and 1 small parboiled sweetbread, finely chopped; then add 1 cup of rich white sauce, ¼ cup stale bread crumbs, 1 egg, 1 pepper chopped, 2 eggs, beaten stiff. Fill buttered timbale moulds, set in pan of hot water cover with buttered paper and bake 15 minutes. Remove to serving dish. Cover with sauce made with ½ large mushroom caps cut in halves, 2 egg whites, then in slices. Sauce in 3 tablespoons of butter five minutes, dredge with 2 tablespoons of flour add ¼ cup of cream and 1 cup of chicken stock and cook two minutes. Season with salt and paprika and add 1 chopped trufflet.

**Fresh Strawberry Tart—**  
Bake plain paste over inverted party pan. Fill with light custard and top with fresh strawberries which have been dredged with powdered sugar.
