CLUB TO MEET AT BURNTSIDE

Will Continue Resort Dinner Sessions; to Again Seek Duck Hunt Area.

The popular resort meetings of the Ely Commercial club will be continued next month, when the club will convene Aug. 25 at Burntside lodge. Members' wives will be guests, and dancing will follow the business meeting.

This was decided Tuesday night at the Basswood lodge meeting, where 40 members and guests were in attendance.

Business conducted follows: The club will again petition the state conservation commission to have a part of the Crooked lake area vacated from the state game refuge to permit the hunting of ducks. Last year a similar request, which also included additional territory, was denied, but upon the suggestion of the commission this year a smaller area is to be asked for.

The club also recommended to the commission that brook trout streams here be closed for 90 days to fishing in an area both a mile above and below the point where trout are planted.

This action followed the revelation that local people started fishing trout at the point where 8-inch fish were stocked immediately after the planting of several weeks ago.

Completion of the Prairie Portage dam, held up when OOC was discontinued, is being urged. This area's first rearing ponds in the Stone country are being harvested and the fingerlings planted in lakes here.
